Homeless Provider Network	Angela Myles	 The last HPN Meeting took place on Wednesday, January 18, 2012. The HPN has created a Steering Committee made up of the HPN Chair, subcommittee chairs, and various others to work together on common goals through the 10-Year Strategy to End Homelessness. The Committee is currently working on prioritizing the recommendations of the 10-Year Strategy to the needs of the County assisted by Dr. Joe Colletti. Once priorities are set, the HPN will then discuss the items together and work together on each issue. The HPN has also implemented a roundtable discussion section at the HPN meetings where attendees have the opportunity to openly discuss different issues which need to be addressed within the County. These issues will be brought to the ICH to move further. 		
Office of Homeless Services	Tom Hernandez	 The ICH members were provided with the OHS Report as a hand out with attachments. (Copies are available upon request). All information can also be found at www.sbcounty.gov/SBCHP. The 2011 Continuum of Care (CoC) Renewals Awards were released on December 20, 2011. The San Bernardino County CoC received a total of \$2,213,277 in renewal awards meaning all renewals were funded this year. HUD anticipates announcing new awards in spring of 2012. The CoC Check-Up is a voluntary internal review survey which San Bernardino County is participating in. This survey will allow the CoC to determine current capacity and performance. The OHS will then use this information to create a standing point to measure outcomes and progress. This will also assist the CoC to look ahead, evaluate, and meet HUD goals or requirements. This check-up is part of the HEARTH implementation. Once the check-up is complete, a report will be submitted. 		

Office of Homeless Services cont.	Tom Hernandez	 The 2011 CoC Application reflected the 2010 CoC achievements. The San Bernardino CoC met or surpassed all 5 HUD CoC goals which looks great for new applications. OHS works closely with HMIS to meet the goals: Chronic homeless beds: goal to increase by 12, CoC increased by 81, which is 69 more than goal. Permanent Housing Stability: goal at 86%, CoC met 95%, which is 9% more than goal. Employment Income at exit: goal at 20%, CoC met goal at 20%. Changes to the goals include increased income at exit versus income at exit. Decreased family homelessness: goal to meet 191, CoC decreased that number by two and hit 189. Exit to Permanent Housing: goal at 75%, CoC met 91%, which is a 16% increase from goal. The HUD Homeless Data Exchange (HDX) has made some changes this year. Everything is electronic through e-snaps and all data is collected through HMIS. It is extremely important for information to be entered correctly and completely. OHS must collect information from those agencies which do not enter their information into HMIS as well. OHS does this through a series of emails and asking agencies to fill out a survey form. HUD has updated the definition of chronically homeless. An attachment was handed out for the brief explanation of changes. Both the federal register and the brief explanation will be posted on the website at www.sbcounty.gov/SBCHP. A full description of the changes can also be found at www.nationaldiliance.org. The updated definition will be used in the next Point-In-Time Count (PITC) and numbers will most likely increase. Programs must adapt to meet the new definition and maximize funding. The 5th Annual Homeless Summit went very well. Over 100 evaluations were received with most containing positive feedback. Looking forward to this year's Homeless Summit, OHS plans to include collaboration, fundraising techniques, grant writing, and access to resources as suggested b

		will also be a focus on veteran homelessness.
		 The AB109 Housing Advisory Committee has met on a regular basis. The committee is currently
		in the process of reviewing other contracts/agreements to create one which will fit the Probation
		Department. Mr. Ricketts has been connected to contacts with Sober Living Homes to create bed
		packages. OHS is working with Mr. Ricketts to create an MOU to contact with these Sober Living
		Homes.
		 California is one of only 11 states and territories that has yet to establish a State ICH. AB1167
		(Fong), which would have created a State ICH, was held under submission by the Senate
		Appropriations Committee and did not go through. Organizations such as Housing California,
		Corporation for Supportive Housing, and the USICH are encouraging Governor Brown to create
		a State ICH.
		 A discussion ensued regarding RDA funds and the impact it will have on the homeless
		population as 20% of the RDA funds went to affordable housing. This funding will dissipate
		as of February 1, 2012. The ICH will have an RDA discussion on the next ICH agenda
		regarding alternative strategies and coming up with a source of revenue; working with the
		State to have certain funding directed toward homelessness.
		 The National Alliance to End Homelessness released their research report on homelessness on
		January 18, 2012. Nationally, the homeless population has decreased. However, in California,
		the numbers have increased. The report is available on their website at
		www.endhomelessness.org.
		 OHS attended a County Vision Meeting on January 19, 2012 in Fontana. Developers, ICH
		representatives, and Supervisor Gonzales were in attendance. Great feedback was given and
		the county is looking at priorities to move the visioning process and issues forward.
		 The Homeless Services Guide is now on google maps. Sandra Wakcher of HS Legislation and
		Research create the entire Guide into a google map from information on an excel spreadsheet
		provided by OHS. All providers and clients can see exactly where others are on the map and get
		directions to the site. The google map is also posted on the website.
		 Supervisor Gonzales would like OHS to explore the option of using google maps for the
		public to identify hot spots for the next PITC. All users will be able to go online to the map
		and indicate hot spots.
		 Action Item and Follow Up: A request was made of OHS to provide background information to
		the San Bernardino Associated Governments (SANBAG) regarding the ICH and to include the
		importance of participation and membership opportunities. OHS presented to the Plans and
		Programs Committee on January 18, 2012. Presentation – San Bernardino County Reentry Collaborative (SBCRC)	Trudy Raymundo & Dr. Maxwell Ohikhuare	 Ms. Raymundo and Dr. Ohikhuare offered the ICH an explanation on the SBCRC. The presentation included information on the background, accomplishments, goals, objectives, and activities of the Collaborative. The SBCRC is interested in working with all in this Collaborative. (Copies of the PowerPoint and hand-outs are available upon request).
2012 Legislative Proposals	Josh Candelaria	 Mr. Candelaria provided an update on assembly bills the Legislative Office is keeping track of and advocating for which deal with the subject of homelessness. Assemblymember John Perez created a task force last year that specifically dealt with homelessness. The task force focused on three key points: Streamlining services. Developing best practices. Stabilizing the funding stream to mitigate the issues regarding homelessness. AB1167 did not go through because of the fiscal impact it would have on the state. The bill will be coming back and will look at designating resources. Advocates are looking at creative ways and funding streams to move the bill forward. ICH members were given a report entitled "The Road Home" for their review. (Copies are available upon request). This report outlines some of the issues driving homelessness and goes over some policies that are being developed to drive the agenda with new legislation moving forward which will be inserted in the next legislative session. The redevelopment impact is roughly \$33.15 million. The loss of this funding is a significant issue the county has been discussing with legislators. The county is looking at how to shape policy moving forward. SB657 is supported and expands the dissolution of RDA funds date from February 1, 2012 to April 15, 2012. This bill is currently awaiting its hearing. SB654 addresses housing funds, about \$2 million statewide, that would be swept away. The County continues to track this bill which contacts an urgency clause meaning the impact would be immediate. The County is looking into creating a tool that would reinvest redevelopment funds. They are trying to find funding sources.

	Sharon Green Josie Gonzales	 Ms. Green stated that her agency, Victor Valley Family Resource Center, has run into a struggle with the city of Victorville. A Code Enforcement Officer cited her agency and tried to close it down, however, did not indicate the infraction nor was it indicated how to comply or fix the situation. There is nothing to address Transitional Housing in the municipal code. Ms. Green contacted OHS and Angela Valles of the City Council to take the issue further. Supervisor Mitzelfelt's office is also assisting with the situation. In addition, Ms. Green emailed the state. Ms. Green presented the challenge: how do we end or assist with the issue of homelessness if agencies are having to battle their cities? Supervisor Gonzales advised Ms. Green to take the issue to the Planning Commission and state the problem as she did at the ICH. She suggested Ms. Green propose to include transitional housing zoning in the form of an amendment. Next, she informed Ms. Green, to reach out to the mayor and council, identify what she has done with the planning commission so that clear direction can be given to include transitional housing zoning in the next amendment. Identify the need, propose the solution, and gain support.
	Darryl Evey	Mr. Evey, Family Assistance Program, asked the ICH for a letter of support last year for a homeless and runaway youth program he wanted to begin. He has made great progress with help from the Homeless Youth Task Force and received final approval on January 24, 2012 at the Planning Commission Meeting. There will be a Grand Opening during the last week of February for their new 12 bed facility in Redlands. All are invited and encouraged to attend.

	Linda Haugan Cheryl Heesen	 Ms. Haugan informed the ICH of the proposed budget cuts to CalWORKS which have a huge effect on those receiving services and have the possibility of increasing homelessness. The new contingency is that for all those on aid who have not worked for two years that do not obtain a job at the end of those two years, their aid will be cut by 40%. This contingency will be retroactive. Ms. Heesen added that the CalWORKS program allows for additional volunteers for agencies. If this program is cut, agencies will lose their volunteers which stands to affect their budgets.
	Allan Rawland	 Mr. Rawland would like to see the 2-1-1 resource guide as well as the veteran guide handed out to clinics, providers, and missions across San Bernardino County. OHS will work with Bill Moseley to carry out this request. The BHRC will now be called the Health Center as it houses the family clinic operated by ARMC, public health programs, and behavioral health and Alcohol and Drug Services programs. This facility will be the first comprehensive, one stop health center. The dedication and Clinic Co-Location Grand

	Allan Rawland	Opening will be March 7, 2012 at 11:30 am located at 850 E. Foothill Blvd, Rialto, CA 92376. All are invited and encouraged to attend. OHS will send out an invite.
		 The new Transitional Aged Youth (TAY aged 18-25) Center on Gilbert Street is almost complete. This is also a program which will house a number of different service agencies including a youth crisis residential program with resources and intensive crisis intervention. The Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI) department will have a new planning process for funds out of MHSA designed to assist people in the beginning stages of their mental health issues. It was suggested that OHS talk to Michelle Dusick, PEI, regarding inviting people from the community and providers to participate in the planning process to uncover some of the unmet needs and begin to look at allocating up to \$5 million for some new initial and early intervention outreach programs under PEI. The planning process will begin in February. Mr. Rawland announces his retirement from San Bernardino County and that Assistant Director, CaSonya Thomas, will be taking his place as the DBH representative for ICH.
	Angela Pasco	Ms. Pasco announced that she received her HUD grant and on October 27, 2011 opened the doors to New Hope Too in Barstow. However, because she has lost the RDA funding, she must scramble to meet the cash match requirements. OHS is working with Ms. Pasco to research grant opportunities.
	Tom Hernandez	On March 28, 2012, the ICH will have a presentation from guest speaker Philip Mangano, CEO and President of the Round Table to Abolish Homelessness. Mr. Mangano has led the task force for all ICH's nationwide and will speak about an opportunity called Ready, Willing, and Able regarding housing probationers and parolees. This program will provide case management as well other services and is looking at partnering with the CoC for match funding. Because of the significance of this meeting and the quantity of people which will be invited, the ICH will move location and time for this meeting. The March ICH will be held at the Inland Regional Center at 10 am – 12 pm and lunch will be served. Invite flyers will go out shortly. All are encouraged to attend.

Announcements

ESG Substantial Amendment

- On Friday, February 17, 2012, Community Development and Housing (CDH)
 Deputy Director Debbie Kamrani, Economic Development Agency Development
 Specialist Linda Mawby, Community Action Partnership Program Specialist
 Justin Feir, and Office of Homeless Services Staff Analyst Christy Hamilton met
 to develop a substantial amendment in order to receive the second allocation for
 the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG). HUD requires that CDH collaborate with
 the HUD CoC lead agency, Office of Homeless Services, to develop a
 substantial plan amendment to the County's Consolidated Plan. The substantial
 amendment must include written standards for the following:
 - ESG-funded activities to ensure coordination with other programs to target homeless people in the CoC's area/area over which the services are coordinated to provide a strategic, community-wide system to prevent and end homelessness.
 - ESG funded activities to ensure coordination with mainstream housing and services that homeless families and individuals and those at risk of homelessness might be eligible.
- A second meeting is scheduled for today with currently funded ESG providers to discuss best practices and incorporate those best practices into the 2nd allocation ESG program design.



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Announcements cont.

Plan for CoC Check-up

- A CoC HEARTH Readiness Results Meeting was held on February 21, 2012 and attended by CoC members that were invited to participate in the CoC Check-up Survey.
- Score summaries were reviewed by the attendees. The Continuum scored well on:
 - CoC primary decision making group (ICH) and related committees have active and diverse membership – 4.6
 - o Has a strategic plan to prevent and end homelessness in the CoC and has a plan that provides direction to the CoC − 4.5
 - CoC has adequate capacity to manage the administrative responsibilities of the CoC – 4.5
 - The CoC as a whole has sufficient knowledge and capacity to provide housing and services – 4.7
- It was highly recommended by HUD based on the survey to include more participation from landlords, private philanthropic agencies, academic research institutions and consumer participation.
- Non-awareness of community specific plans to end homelessness other than the 10-Year Strategy to End Homelessness and alignment to the Strategy was also highlighted.
- An area of concern was adequate funding for HMIS.
- Also persons experiencing homelessness have difficulty navigating through the CoC.

Upland City Homeless Count

- The City of Upland Homeless Count was conducted on February 22, 2012 from 5:00 am to 9:00 am. There were approximately 40 volunteers in attendance along with city staff and the Office of Homeless Services. Breakfast and lunch was provided by the City to all volunteers.
- The Upland Homeless Count Committee and key person task force had identified approximately 20 "green" zones to canvas for homeless in Upland. These zones are primarily in CDBG/blight areas.
- A breakfast for homeless will be provided by city providers on March 2nd at the New Life Christian Center to encourage additional homeless residents to participate in a follow-up survey.
- The completion of the Homeless Count in Upland along with the results of a follow-up Homeless Survey will provide a wide-range of information that will serve as the basis for developing city-wide strategies to respond to the unmet needs and gaps in services to help people exit life on the streets.

City Food Distribution Lists

- A food distribution list of community and faith-based providers was developed for the City of San Bernardino. The list provides a quick overview of the organizations that provide free food or meals to the public (see Report 2A attached).
- A list will be developed for other major cities, with smaller cities included on regional lists. Information will be obtained using the 2-1-1 system. These lists will be updated regularly and will be shared with local service providers and through alternative public distribution. They will also be posted on our website.

Donations for Homeless Partnership

- Quilted Hugs Donated more than 20,000 blankets and sheets to the homeless service providers through the Partnership.
- Hanes Donated 6 pallets of new Hanes undergarments and clothing that was received by 26 of our nonprofit and faith-based homeless service providers.
- Kellogg's Donated 6 pallets of reusable bags to be given to the homeless at upcoming project connects and the Point-in-Time Count.
- PRPP Donated 1 pallet of Meals Ready to Eat = 396 meals (meals expire 5 years, 6 months from February 2012).

Morongo Basin Haven

- The Office of Homeless Services (OHS) presented an overview of the Partnership to the newly formed Morongo Basin Haven (part of the Basin Wide Foundation). The Haven is looking at opening a homeless resource center and shelter in the Yucca Valley/Joshua Tree area.
- Cindy Melland from the Basin Wide Foundation had offered to donate a building for the Haven to use. OHS invited the Morongo Basin Haven members to participate in the Partnership and provided them with meeting dates and additional information/resources.

AB109 Housing Advisory Committee Update

- The Housing Advisory Committee met on February 16, 2012 with Probation Staff (Audulio Ricketts, Julie Hovis, Sean Engelhardt, and Jeanette Oliva) to discuss the upcoming Day Reporting Centers, housing for homeless probationers and key tasks still needing to be accomplished.
- Sample contracts were provided to Mr. Ricketts and Mr. Engelhardt to assist in the development of a Request for Proposal and an eventual memorandum of understanding.

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Inland Empire mayors discuss demise of redevelopment agencies, paint gloomy picture

ONTARIO -- The mayors of the five largest cities in the Inland Empire warned Tuesday of a "fire sale" as cities are forced to sell properties held by their respective redevelopment agencies.

The drastic action is being required by the California Supreme Court's decision last year that state government has the authority to eliminate more than 400 city redevelopment agencies.

Ontario Mayor Paul Leon, who was among the mayors speaking to the Inland Valley Daily Bulletin's editorial board, summarized the sentiments of other attendees when he said: "Redevelopment worked. So why would you end something that works so well... I am mystified."

One of the more serious consequences of this state action, San Bernardino Mayor Pat Morris said, is that cities are going to be forced to "dump properties on a depressed market."

And among the buyers will be "the same folks that we (redevelopment agencies) took (the land) from ... in the first place."

Many of these past owners - and likely future owners - are out-of-towners with no interest in the local communities where they hold land, he said.

Some are foreign investors "just looking for a place to park their money," Morris said.

Under these new owners, the parcels will transition from a sparkplug of future d evelopment to a deterrent to development, he said.

In San Bernardino's case, much of the land acquired by its redevelopment agency was done during the real estate boom days for the purpose of eliminating blight through new development.

For that reason, "top dollar" was paid for properties, which now will be sold to investors at rock-bottom prices, Morris said

"This makes no business sense at all," he said.

Fontana Mayor Acquanetta Warren warned that states including Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and Nevada will have a tremendous advantage in the

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recruitment of new businesses because they will be able to sweeten the pot by funding land acquisition and certain infrastructure improvements.

Fontana and other California cities will simply be noncompetitive - with meager resources to entice future job creators, Warren said.

Morris said there are no other tools cashstrapped cities can tap to replace the funding resources offered through redevelopment agencies.

John R. Gillison, city manager for Rancho Cucamonga, said that economic development in one city has been a tool whose benefits ripple across boundary lines.

For example, when freeway infrastructure is improved or when Auto Club Speedway in Fontana has a race, many communities feel the ripple effect, Gillison said.

"This was a financing tool to start climbing out of the recession.... Without this tool we are fighting with one arm," Gillison said.

The mayors rattled off names of many of the region's biggest projects, saying that RDA funding made them all possible.

These included both Ontario Mills and Rancho Cucamonga's Victoria Gardens.

Leon said that a \$20 million mixed-use development slated for downtown Ontario is on hold because of the demise of RDAs.

"We had to stop rebuilding downtown," he said.

Rancho Cucamonga Mayor L. Dennis Michael said that even a recent job fair held at L.A./Ontario International Airport - which drew some 2,500 job seekers - couldn't be duplicated without RDA funding.

With the region's aging population increasing, several mayors expressed concerns that seniors will be priced out of the state because RDA funding was the lifeblood for senior housing projects - as it was for affordable family housing.

"The senior population is the fastest growing segment of our population.... (The state) has just told them they can't live here anymore," Warren said.

"Affordable housing is important here because we are an affordable region.... People need these assets so they can lead a life quality," Morris said.

For many projects consumed by the meltdown of redevelopment agencies, federal matches will be returned to Washington and bond monies sent back to investors, the mayors said.

And they speculated that this demonstration of instability will haunt California in terms of higher interest rates when, at some point in the future, new bond issues are sought to fund infrastructure or development projects.

Morris said the public did not understand what redevelopment did from their area and for that reason, objected little as these beneficial

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programs were pushed into oblivion by Gov. Jerry Brown.

Riverside Mayor Ronald O. Loveridge and Riverside City Manager Scott C. Barber also attended the meeting Tuesday.
