In September 2007, the San Bernardino County Homeless Partnership (SBCHP) was formed to provide a more focused approach to our goal of ending homelessness within the County. The Partnership consists of city governments, community based organizations, faith-based organizations, educational institutes, non-profit organizations, private industry, and federal, state, and local government.

SBCHP was developed to promote a strong collaboration between agencies to direct the planning, development, and implementation of the County's 10-year-plan to end chronic homelessness. The Partnership meets on the third Wednesday of each month at the Behavioral Health Resource Center in Rialto. The Partnership facilitates better communication, planning, coordination, and cooperation among all entities that provide services and/or resources for the relief of homelessness in San Bernardino County.

Mission Statement

The Mission of the San Bernardino County Homeless Partnership is to provide a system of care that is inclusive, well planned, coordinated and evaluated and is accessible to all who are homeless and those at-risk of becoming homeless.

Call to Order Welcome and Introductions	Anthony Brazier	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Attendees were welcomed to the meeting and asked to introduce themselves.
Approve November 19, 2014 Minutes		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Minutes were approved as written after a quorum was reached.
CONSENT ITEMS		
None	Anthony Brazier	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • There were no consent items however Anthony Brazier asked if there was anyone who could attend the Interagency Council on Homelessness (ICH) meeting as an alternate because he could not attend every month due to a scheduling conflict. Tom Hernandez explained how ICH is the designated policy making body in addition to the Continuum of Care (CoC). They are responsible for determining how the money is allocated and make recommendations for other funding sources. Jeff Little was nominated and accepted as the designee however he did say he applied for one of the two General Member-At-Large positions for ICH. A recommendation hasn't been made for those positions yet and won't be made until May so Jeff will be the alternate for now.
DISCUSSION ITEMS		
Resource and Linkage	Anthony Brazier	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Anthony Brazier shared a Pathway to Housing flow chart with an information request on the back. • Regional leaders meet prior to the ICH meeting on steering committees and had the idea of co-opting and bringing all available services to the table. • Anthony asked everyone to take the flowchart back to their agency and help fill it out. If you are a provider that serves these particular populations they would like to know. • What are the access points, meaning what is eligibility and where do they have to go? What are the housing options for that particular population? Do you offer wrap around services and what are they? • The back should also be filled out for each population served. He requested they be brought back to the next meeting. If you know of other agencies that provide services that you use, ask them to fill one out as well. They will be collected and distributed to all service providers and 211.

Transportation Resources United Way 2-1-1	Oswaldo Maysonet	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Oswaldo said he was tasked to bridge the gap between service providers and transportation providers in San Bernardino County. We are the largest county in the nation so transportation is a challenge for our vulnerable population. It would be of value to understand what is out there. • Fixed Route Transit Providers such as Omni Trans would be your city, inner city bus, light rail and rail. • Demand Response is a "dial a ride" service which needs to be arranged in advance to include taxi cabs and ride share programs.

		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Travel training is available to teach people how to navigate city buses. • Volunteer Driver Reimbursement programs are available for persons who are homebound and do not have family who can take them to doctor appointments, etc. They would have to find someone to transport them and the volunteer could submit a voucher for reimbursement for their mileage through VTRANS. • Transportation Access Programs usually help needy populations. Most buses are able to accommodate people with disabilities. • You can find all this information including trip plan at 211VetLink.org. • Anthony Brazier said to consider how far the bus service is from your establishment or if that bus service is accessible from where you are sending them. Osvaldo also said to consider the access when planning your sites as well. • Anthony Brazier said there are grants available that can fund shuttle bus services to appointments, grocery shopping, etc. such as one that Foothill Aids Project has where they partner with Central City Lutheran Mission a grant through San Bernardino Associated Governments (SANBAG). • Personal Care Assistants are allowed to ride free of charge after rider obtains certification. • Public and Specialized Transportation Advisory and Coordination Council (PASTACC) is a body of all transportation providers that meets every 2 months and provides transportation grant opportunities. • If serving veterans, there are transportation resources at the VA if they are eligible.
Opening of the San Bernardino Access Center	Wade Kyle	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Dr. Wade Kyle is the Program Manager for Mercy House who announced the upcoming Grand Opening of the San Bernardino Access Center. The Access Center should be ready by April 15, 2015. The site selected is at Seccombe Park. The San Bernardino Homeless Access Center is currently sharing an office with Salvation Army in San Bernardino. The focus now is outreach with landlords and service providers. Information on the Open House will be sent out by the Office of Homeless Service at a later date. • Dr. Kyle has worked in community enrichment and services since 1973, but has been with Mercy House for the last 3 weeks. • Currently working with a few referrals for rapid rehousing until the access center is open. Once open will have bus passes, hotel vouchers, gas vouchers, food vouchers and intense case management. They will have a full-time case manager. • The Access Center will have basic services such as showers, hygiene products, groceries etc. but most of all, hope and dignity.
