Mission/Vision of San Bernardino County	Gregory Devereaux	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Mr. Devereaux has worked in Housing and around the issue of homelessness his entire career. He understands that homelessness is a difficult issue that has many facets as the homeless population is not uniform. Each population dealt with has different issues which need to be addressed individually. He feels that homelessness does not get enough attention in the County or the State. Mr. Devereaux feels that good solutions need to be developed, however, those are very difficult to find in the current economic times.</li> <li>▪ Mr. Devereaux extends his applause and support to the Interagency Council on Homelessness (ICH). Homelessness is the kind of issue that can only be dealt with by collaboration and using the scarce resources wisely. The government alone cannot deal with homelessness; it takes the entire community to address the issue.</li> <li>▪ When Mr. Devereaux took his position, he noticed the County did not have a County-wide vision or goals. Each city had their own agenda. In addition, each of the five supervisorial districts also had their own agenda. There is a need to incorporate all agendas into one fluid agenda for the entire County. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ The Board is currently engaged in a County-wide visioning exercise. There will be a total of</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

<p>Mission/Vision of San Bernardino County <i>cont.</i></p>	<p>Gregory Devereaux</p>	<p>eighteen community meetings, three of which are on the night of January 26, 2011. Those three are Bloomington, Chino, and Lake Arrowhead. The Board and CEO are reaching out to the community and panels of experts. Each meeting tends to include forty to sixty people and we have been receiving very good input. The issue of homelessness is brought up at every meeting.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ The ICH is doing a great job in getting the word out there. Homelessness is increasing and becoming a bigger problem. The collaboration among providers is creating a bigger emphasis.</li> <li>▪ There is an online survey as well. So far there has been a positive response rate and over 2,000 surveys taken. Mr. Devereaux urges the ICH to participate in either the meetings or the survey to bring up the issues they are facing.</li> <li>▪ Homelessness will be addressed in the County Vision because it is a very prominent community concern.</li> <li>▪ The importance of the County Vision is to use those limited resources toward a clearly identified ends for the County as a whole. An end result must be identified so people will work in the same direction.</li> </ul>
	<p>Kent Paxton</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Mr. Paxton stated that the poverty in San Bernardino City has risen from 32% in 2009 to 43% in 2010. The governor's budget proposal may bring decreased dollars to the City. He asks Mr. Devereaux if they have had any thought about meeting with the cities to discuss the potential impact collectively of the cuts made in the governor's budget proposal.</li> </ul>
	<p>Gregory Devereaux</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Mr. Devereaux answered that currently there is very little dialogue between the City and the County, in part, because they have different responsibilities. However, they have overlapping interests. Part of the County Vision exercise is to start that dialogue between the cities and the County. The County has five different agendas and the cities have their own different agendas. The County Vision needs to work together with the cities. The Vision exercise is the first step to opening communication.</li> </ul>
	<p>Cheryl Heesen</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Ms. Heesen would like to see the coordination to access of funding throughout the county. She currently receives CoC funding on one side and California Department of Housing (CDH) funding on the other side. Each has their own set of requirements and many times they do not match. The two are disconnected and Ms. Heesen hopes the County Vision will assist in connecting the two.</li> </ul>
	<p>Gregory Devereaux</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Mr. Devereaux believes that is exactly the reason to have a County-wide Vision. The Board needs to define an end to which agencies and County departments can work on together. The Vision should be the first step in getting everyone to work together.</li> </ul>
	<p>Patricia Nickols Gregory Devereaux</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Ms. Nickols asked, "Since homelessness is a repetitive issue in the Visioning meetings, what do you see as a response to that?"</li> <li>▪ Mr. Devereaux answered that the Visioning exercise itself is not to identify what the response is. The Visioning exercise will identify where the County wants to go. The County must address all issues in the community including homelessness and take care of each together. Once the issues have been identified, it is up to everyone to decide what their role is and how to get there, defining the strategy.</li> </ul>

Mission/Vision of San Bernardino County <i>cont.</i>	Josie Gonzales	<p>This will probably take place over the next year and a half. The CEO plans to look at implementing the strategy with next year's budget.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Please contact the CEO's office for any other questions, suggestions, or concerns.</li> <li>▪ The ICH must embrace change. The County has a CEO that understands and is reaching out to become aware of the issues in the County. He is working on bringing issues such as homelessness to the forefront of the County agenda. The funding is there, it is the job of the ICH to connect the lines, to straighten the avenues to economic resources.</li> <li>▪ In regards to Mr. Paxton's questions about what the County is doing about the governor's proposed budget cuts, Madam Chair reached out to Nancy Cisneros, the California League of Cities Public Affairs Manager. Madam Chair personally pledged that Nancy would have her full commitment at the County level to begin working as a united front so as not to allow the State to divide the cities and counties. Madam Chair plans to work with other counties to do the same, so the State will have to look at counties together and will address the impacts everyone is facing as a whole.</li> </ul>

Homeless Provider Network	Angela Myles	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ The Homeless Provider Network is looking into the 10-Year Strategy to End Homelessness. The document is a living document which needs to be revised. With the current changes in the economy, programs, and legislature, the HPN is looking to inform the County and incorporate those changes as best as possible.</li> <li>▪ In order to facilitate making those changes in the 10-Year Strategy, various members of the HPN, including the subcommittee chairs, have formed the HPN Steering Committee. The Steering Committee will focus on moving the 10-Year Strategy forward and giving individuality to each subcommittee duties to foster working together. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ With the help of OHS, The Steering Committee has enlisted the support of Dr. Joseph Colletti, who is very familiar with San Bernardino County as he is also the consultant of the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) CoC application.</li> <li>▪ The Steering Committee had its first meeting, which was a brainstorming meeting to see which direction they were planning to go. The members took a look at the different strategies, measures, and points within the 10-Year Strategy. They looked for which strategies needed to be more cultivated, which could be postponed as they were not effective at this time in our county, which recommendations were not effective at this time, and which recommendations needed a closer look at in collaborating together.</li> <li>▪ Ms. Myles plans to bring the information from the Steering Committee back to the HPN, where they will be able to discuss those ideas in the new Roundtable Discussion format implemented for HPN.</li> </ul> </li> <li>▪ HPN has also introduced a new Funder Spotlight section for the HPN meetings where funders are able to present and inform Providers about what is needed to gain funding from their agencies. For the month of January, the HPN was fortunate enough to hear from San Manuel Band of Mission Indians. The HPN will continue to have its Provider Spotlights as well where Providers can come together and offer information on what they do and how they can help the county in order to</li> </ul>

Homeless Provider Network <i>cont.</i>	Angela Myles	<p>collaborate and make a difference as a whole.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ The goal for HPN in the 2011 year is to dig deep into the 10-Year Strategy and make it begin to happen. The HPN will be able to do that with the help of agencies and partners as well as everyone around the ICH table.</li> </ul>
Office of Homeless Services	Tom Hernandez	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ The ICH members were provided with the OHS Report as a hand out with attachments.</li> <li>▪ The Point-In-Time Count (PITC) would begin on the night of January 26, 2011 and continue the next night, January 27, 2011. The night of the 26<sup>th</sup> would consist of the Valley and High Desert areas from 9 pm – 1 am. The Outer Desert will be canvassed on the night of the 27<sup>th</sup> from 9 pm – 1 am. ICH members are still welcome to participate, please contact the Office of Homeless Services (OHS) or come to one of the Deployment Centers. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ A list of Deployment Centers with managers and contact numbers was handed out. Mr. Hernandez would like to thank Nancy Swanson, Director of the Transitional Assistance Department, for providing all the Deployment Centers. There are twelve Deployment Centers throughout the county, 10 for the night of the 26<sup>th</sup> and 2 for the night of the 27<sup>th</sup>. Christy Hamilton has volunteered to be the Deployment Center coordinator.</li> <li>▪ There are over 500 volunteers signed up with 166 census block areas to canvas. The block areas were chosen based on density.</li> <li>▪ Law Enforcement is aware of the count and will be working with OHS.</li> </ul> </li> <li>▪ The 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Homeless Summit Evaluations (Attachment 2B) were overwhelmingly positive. There were over 178 attendees. Most attendees really liked the venue and the information they received. Some suggestions included to add more grant-writing and funding workshops. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Funding has been addressed through the HPN. Funders have been invited to present at each meeting.</li> <li>▪ Please review Summit Evaluations and contact OHS if you have further comment as OHS has begun planning for the 2011 Homeless Summit.</li> </ul> </li> <li>▪ Continuum of Care (CoC) application was submitted on November 16, 2010 with 13 renewals and 6 new projects (Attachment 2C). A total of \$2,328,665 was requested for renewals, \$4,127,486 for 5 new projects, and 1 project submitted for the permanent housing bonus of \$915,181. In total, the application submission was \$7,371,332. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ On January 19, 2011, HUD announced the renewal awards. A total of \$1.41 billion was given to all CoCs across the nation. San Bernardino County received all renewals in the amount of \$2,342,213 which was a little more than requested. An additional \$13,548 went to the Shelter Plus Care program Project Stepping Stones run through the Housing Authority. Please refer to Attachment 2D which is a Press Release from HUD and a list of renewals received.</li> </ul> </li> <li>▪ The San Bernardino County Homeless Provider Annual Report was finalized and printed in late November. Each ICH member was provided with a copy in their packet. Included in the Annual Report is a history of the Homeless Partnership, the accomplishments of the year, and a 2011 calendar for both the HPN and ICH meetings.</li> <li>▪ In order to modify and work to carry out the 10-Year Strategy, a Steering Committee has been</li> </ul>

They are looking at pushing Phase 1 quickly. The first phase deals with human services including those with mental health issues.</li> <li>▪ Ms. Heesen would like to point out that dealing with the homeless means that an agency takes care of everything, not just a place to stay. The agency must try and find the person a job and the resources to ensure they become independently stable and do not end up homeless again.</li> <li>▪ The State is proposing to send a lot of the resources back to the County. Unfortunately, when economy is hurting, those excess monies go with it.</li> <li>▪ Mr. Harrison would like to know how they can work with the family and students that are homeless. The students are not provided the opportunity to take advantage of their education. The Federal definition needs to expand.</li> <li>▪ The bill AB12 deals with emancipated youth. The county does provide services to emancipated youth.</li> <li>▪ AB12 deals with prevention and is extremely important to issues of homelessness.</li> <li>▪ Ms. Boring represents the Department of Rehabilitation. They provide assessments, vocational training, job preparation, job placement, and follow up. They have orientation meetings every Monday morning from 8:30 am – 9:15 am at 464 W. 4<sup>th</sup> Street in San Bernardino. The Department of Rehabilitation partners with San Bernardino Department of Behavioral Health (DBH) to select individuals who are work-ready and the Department of Rehabilitation will get them placed in a job.</li> <li>▪ There is housing and education assistance at the Department of Rehabilitation. Assemblymember Torres spoke at the Homeless Summit in November. She was very passionate and this is a great opportunity to utilize her to assist and engage in discussion to form some guiding principles for addressing the issue of homelessness.</li> <li>▪ Ms. Dowdy states there is a need for someone to advocate for the homeless students at a higher level. She needs to see the numbers. Many more resources are offered for foster youth, but not for homeless students. Ms. Dowdy would like to see Assemblymember Torres advocate for the homeless students who are on the streets as well as those living in inadequate situations such as garages or 4-5 families in one small place.</li> <li>▪ Ms. Nickols spoke on behalf of the bill which would have created a State ICH. Her suggestion was for the ICH to support the bill with letters. There is a lack of leadership at the State level when it comes to homelessness. There are issues with State agencies not coordinating services. She would like to see funding criteria in line across all agencies. If resources can be coordinated at the State level, Providers would have a better ability to better service their clients at the local level.</li> </ul>
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Roundtable Discussion <i>cont.</i>	Josh Candelaria	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>If the State was to address the issue of coordinating services, it would result in cost saving as well as savings in staff time.</li> </ul>
	Garner Morris	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Mr. Morris offered to assist with high desert contacts. He would also like to know how to deal with the children of homeless persons.</li> </ul>
	Connie Boring	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Ms. Boring suggested San Bernardino County Transitional Age Youth (TAY) Program located in San Bernardino. Contact Andre Bossieux.</li> </ul>
	CaSonya Thomas	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Eligibility for TAY is 16-25 so for children under the age of 16, it is still very difficult to find funding and services. Ms. Thomas is appreciative of the Department of Rehabilitation's partnership and education; however, there is an insufficient supply to meet the need despite all collaborations. Improvements have been made through new partnerships, but the need is still there. For DBH, the primary goal is offering mental health services, housing is second.</li> </ul>
	Josh Candelaria	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Specifically, this roundtable discussion was meant to brainstorm and find out the parameters to set the agenda. Mr. Candelaria suggested it would be beneficial for ICH members to participate in the dialogue with Assemblymember Torres. This will hopefully shape State policy.</li> </ul>
	Josie Gonzales	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>ICH members need to be present for the meeting with Assemblymember Torres and prepared with a list of questions respective to the areas of interest and delivering services. Chair Gonzales would like to see a coordinated presentation which will give Assemblymember Torres a very clear direction of what she needs to do in order to address the homeless needs in her district. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Chair Gonzales agrees with Ms. Nickols in her suggestion to write letters of support to Assemblywoman Torres letting her know that ICH is on board with her re-introducing AB1177, what needs to be done to improve the bill, and how the ICH can help.</li> </ul> </li> <li>ICH must be able to get to the State level. There is an Inland Empire Caucus taking place. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><b>Action Item:</b> Chair Gonzales asks Mr. Candelaria to formulate a presentation which she can make to Assemblywoman Torres.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Chair Gonzales plans to work collectively with all five Supervisors because it does encompass the entire county and perhaps partner with Riverside. She will be working hard to promote an Inland Empire approach rather than San Bernardino County just being lumped together with Los Angeles. Between Riverside and San Bernardino Counties, there are more variety of impacts and population growth issues that Los Angeles County does not have, therefore, San Bernardino County must partner with Riverside in order to gain the clout and identification that is equal to Los Angeles County. There are also transitional residents who have come from Los Angeles County to stay in San Bernardino County which is not being recognized at the State level.</li> </ul>

	Josie Gonzales	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><b>Action Item:</b> Chair Gonzales asked Tom Hernandez of the Office of Homeless Services (OHS) to assist Mr. Candelaria and Mr. Michael Delgado from the County's Office of Inter-governmental Relations, in putting together a list of issues to present to Assemblymember Torres. She has also asked him to assist with the coordination with Assemblymember Torres's office.</li> </ul>

	<p>Linda Haugan</p> <p>Cheryl Heesen</p> <p>Brenda Dowdy</p> <p>Angela Pasco</p> <p>Josie Gonzales</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ The governor's cuts will contribute to homelessness in the county and state. One such cut is to the CalWORKS program. They plan to cut grants by 13%. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ If the budget goes through, effective July 1<sup>st</sup>, all families will be cut off at once. That is 6,000 cases or 12% of the caseload. This will cause an increase in homelessness.</li> <li>▪ In Phase 2 of the governor's budget, CalWORKS is supposed to be realigned to the County with caseloads increasing. Ms. Haugan is hoping Phase 1 takes care of all cuts needed in the state.</li> </ul> </li> <li>▪ Also, there will no longer be a safety net to assist children when services to families have maxed out. The maximum was 60 months, but has been cut down to 48 months with the new proposed budget.</li> <li>▪ Although they are restoring Stage 3 effective April, there will be massive cuts in child care. There is a need for people to look at resources to replace these cuts now.</li> <li>▪ The government is asking for a proposal by mid-March to realign all programs. It takes much longer than 2 months to prepare a proposal correctly.</li> <li>▪ Family Service Association (FSA) of Redlands received a \$300,000 grant in 2009 for the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP) services. The money is almost gone and it has been less than two years. Many programs are facing the same problem. HPRP is not going to make the three years it proposed. The lack of funding will also increase homelessness. FSA cannot take any more new cases. Funds are limited and more cuts are to come. There is a major need for monies to support families.</li> <li>▪ <b>Action Item:</b> A request was made of Ms. Haugan to notify the community of cuts that will occur. Ms. Haugan has agreed to send the information to Mr. Hernandez from the OHS to distribute.</li> <li>▪ If anyone is serving unaccompanied youth, please contact Ms. Dowdy. She has a homeless youth taskforce which is working on obtaining a safe house for unaccompanied youth and needs the numbers as well as data. She will be obtaining information from each school district, but would like to gain as much information from the agencies serving this population as possible. Ms. Dowdy can be reached at 909-386-2634.</li> <li>▪ Ms. Pasco attended the County Visioning exercise in Barstow. She was asked to write a letter as to what she thought the county would look like in twenty years. There is a push to take the online survey and she suggests the ICH members oblige. Ms. Pasco did mention at the meeting the success of the county to implement the 10-Year Plan.</li> <li>▪ The ICH is a crucial instrument that will bring identification to the needs of Providers.</li> </ul>
