Continuum of Care Update	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Office of Homeless Services (OHS) has submitted the Continuum of Care (CoC) application on October 28, 2014, with a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) due date of October 30th. • Twenty-two Project Applications were submitted for a total request of \$8,325,580.00 in homeless services funding, planning, and bonus award. The application was approved for submittal by the ICH on October 15, 2014. • A Permanent Housing Bonus was also submitted in the amount of \$1,487,151.00 for three years. • The OHS also submitted for a planning grant in the amount of \$124,163 in order to conduct planning for three key areas to improve in the design and carrying out the collaborative process for the application to HUD: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Improve the promotion and coordination of the Affordable Care Act within the CoC; 2) Improve efforts with the local housing authorities to prevent and end homelessness within the CoC; and 3) 3) Promote the adoption within various jurisdictions and agencies of a housing first approach within the CoC geographic area. • These are all required responses to the collaborative application that must be submitted annually. 	



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HUD - Veterans Administration Supportive Housing

- On October 1, 2014, the HUD and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs announced more than \$62 million to help more than 9,000 homeless veterans find permanent supportive housing.
- San Bernardino County received an additional 65 tenant based vouchers to our local Housing Authority of the County of San Bernardino that will be used in conjunction with the Veterans Administration Loma Linda to provide permanent supportive housing to our most vulnerable of veterans (see attached Report 2A).
- There is a potential for an additional award in the next coming months.

Colton Project Connect Participation

- The Colton Project Connect that was held on September 25, 2014 was a success. With the City of Colton tying the event to their food distribution day we reached out to many individuals and families.
- The following are statistics from the day of the event.
 - Attendees registered – 218 households: 636 individuals within the household, 68 were identified as homeless and 21 were identified as veterans.

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Supportive Services for Veterans Administration (SSVF) Surge Awards

- On September 30, 2014, Secretary of Veterans Affairs Robert A. McDonald announced the award of \$207 million in SSVF grants that will help an additional 70,000 homeless and at-risk Veterans and their families.
- The grants will be distributed to 82 non-profit agencies and include “surge” funding for 56 high need communities.
- In conjunction and support from the San Bernardino County CoC, up to 2 nonprofits were eligible to apply for up to \$3 million in surge funding which was in addition to the awards announced on August 11, 2014. The U.S. Veterans Initiative received \$1.5 million in the announcement for services that will be provided over a 3 year period (see attached Report 2B).

8th Annual Homeless Summit

- The 8th Annual Homeless Summit will be held next week on Wednesday, November 5, 2014 at the Ontario Convention Center located at 2000 E. Convention Center Way, Ontario, CA 91764, from 10:00 am to 3:30 pm, with check-in beginning at 9:30 am.
- We have reached capacity in terms of RSVP of interested attendees and those registering now are being placed on a waiting list.

2014 SSI/ SSDI Outreach, Access, and Recovery (SOAR) Report

- OHS provided four trainings in 2014. March 24/25, July 14/15, July 28/29, and September 22/23. A total of 66 people were trained on the SOAR method.
- Policy Research Associates (PSA) and SAMHSA, the SOAR sponsors, are encouraging all SOAR trainers to attend the Leadership Academy (online curriculum) in order to transition to the online training for attendees. The new style training allows each participant to train on the SOAR method during an online course designed to mimic an actual SSI/SSDI submission. They are encouraged to complete the process quickly, but have 60 days (the same time period allowed by the Social Security Administration to turn in a completed application from the original filing date) to complete the course in its entirety. The designated SOAR trainer in each community will then follow up with a one day refresher class for any technical assistance and/or answers to questions the participants may have need of.
- Our current goal for upcoming training is to offer a two day class to outlying areas primarily in the Desert areas of Victorville and Morongo Basin communities.

Department of Behavioral Health-This item is an **AMENDMENT TO CONTRACT WITH THE INSTITUTE FOR URBAN INITIATIVES FOR HOMELESS CONSULTING SERVICES** effective September 23, 2014 to Contract No. 13-694 with the Institute for Urban Initiatives , for the provision of homeless consulting services to the County of San Bernardino, in support of the Continuum of Care Homeless Assistance Program, expanding services to include planning for the implementation of the 2-1-1 based centralized intake system, increasing the total contract amount by \$55,000, from \$93,150 to \$148,150, with no change to the contract period from August 30, 2013 through June 30, 2015..

Background: DBH acts in the role of agent on behalf of the Continuum of Care (CoC) in submission of HUD CoC grant application for the County. The Institute for Urban Initiatives (Urban Initiatives) provides consulting services to DBH Office of Homeless Services (OHS) to obtain guidance and technical assistance regarding the HUD competitive grant process, including the newly implemented Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing (HEARTH) Act of 2009. For 2013, approximately 3,460 clients were served by programs funded through the HUD CoC grant program. This amendment will allow the Urban Initiatives to provide additional consulting services to assist OHS in planning for the 2-1-1 based coordinated assessment and centralized intake system.

The 2-1-1 based coordinated assessment and centralized intake system was originally presented and approved by HUD for planning funds in 2012. However, due to funding constraints experienced by HUD, planning projects were placed on hold. In 2014, planning

funds were made available and on June 24, 2014 (Item No. 31), the Board approved a grant award from HUD for the CoC Assistant Planning Project to provide funding for DBH's planning project. Procurement for this funding was not viable as the one-year planning process must be completed by June 30, 2015. DBH is recommending amending the contract with Urban Initiatives because they are familiar with our County's CoC process, able to meet the required timeframes, and has satisfactorily provided homeless consulting services to the County in support of the CoC Homeless Assistance Program. DBH will continue to monitor contractor performance on a regular basis to ensure contract compliance standards are met.

Financial Impact: This item does not impact Discretionary General Funding (Net County Cost). This cost for these additional services will not exceed \$55,000 and will be funded with U.S. HUD Planning Project funds.

Department of Behavioral Health- This item is an **AMENDMENT TO CONTRACTS FOR MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES ACT INNOVATION – HOLISTIC CAMPUS EVALUATION** for Mental Health Systems Inc., and Victor Community Support Services Inc., for Mental Health Services Act Innovation, Holistic Campus Evaluation extending the contracts an additional 9 months for evaluation purposes and increasing the amounts by \$225, 000 each for a total of \$450,000.

Background: The innovation component of MHSA is expected to produce creative projects that the County designs and implements for a defined time period, as well as an evaluation of the project to develop new best practices in mental health services and supports that address the need to increase access to underserved groups, increase the quality of services and promote interagency collaboration.

The Holistic Campus time-limited project brings together a diverse group of individuals, family members and community providers to create individual-focused resources, networks, and strategies, tailored towards building upon already established cultural strengths. Emphasis is placed on the Holistic Campus providing services within a non-traditional setting closely tied to the community and its resources, rather than in a traditional behavioral health setting. The MHSA Innovative Holistic Campus project and location is expected to be much more accessible, culturally/linguistically competent and relevant, and provide services in a more community friendly setting than what is currently offered in traditional behavioral health clinics that are often stigmatized.

DBH will use the grant award to continue providing HMIS data and evaluation for the implementation, training, reporting, and technical support services for homeless service providers within the County, CoC, and San Bernardino County Homeless Partnership.

Financial Impact: This item does not require additional Discretionary General Funding (Net County Cost). DBH will meet the required match of \$62,540 through existing Mental Health Services Act funds.

Department of Behavioral Health – This item is a **GRANT APPLICATION TO THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT FOR THE CONTINUUM OF CARE HOMELESS ASSISTANCE PROGRAM** approving and authorizing the submission of two grant applications to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, in the total amount of \$374,321, for the period of November 1, 2015 through October 31, 2016 for: 1) Homeless Management Information System funding, in the amount of \$250,158, and 2) Continuum of Care Planning Project Application funding, in the amount of \$124,163.

Background: The submission of these grant applications will allow DBH to seek funding to maintain the HUD mandated county-wide HMIS, a web-enabled database used by homeless services providers to capture information about the San Bernardino County persons they serve. Additionally, DBH will use the CoC Planning funding to enhance the HUD required activities of the CoC. The grant applications are due by October 30, 2014.

DBH will use the HMIS funds to continue providing HMIS ongoing process and outcome evaluation to homeless service providers within the County of San Bernardino CoC, and the San Bernardino County Homeless Partnership through the implementation, training, reporting, and technical support services within the HMIS. Data is used to capture information regarding homelessness and the effectiveness of local homeless advocacy and policy development that result in targeted services.

DBH will utilize the CoC Planning funding for three key areas to improve the design and carrying out the collaborative process for the application to HUD: 1) Improve the promotion and coordination of the Affordable Care Act within the CoC; 2) Improve efforts with the local housing authorities to prevent and end homelessness within the CoC; and 3) Promote the adoption

within various jurisdictions and agencies of a housing first approach within the CoC geographic area.

Financial Impact: This item does not require additional Discretionary Funding (Net County Cost). HUD requires a minimum of 25% cash and/or in-kind match for the grant applications for the HMIS and CoC Planning Project Application fund (at least \$62,540 and \$31,041 respectively). DBH will meet or exceed the required match through existing MHSA and Human Services funds.

Moving Forward to Action

On September 2007, the Board of Supervisors (BOS) approved the creation of the San Bernardino County Homeless Partnership (Partnership) to provide leadership and strategic planning in an effort to eliminate the root causes of homelessness within San Bernardino County. The Partnership is comprised of representatives from community-based organizations, faith-based organizations, educational institutions, county and city governments, and public and private agencies. Additionally, the Board formed the Office of Homeless Services (OHS) to provide administrative support to the Partnership.

One of OHS's responsibilities is the administration of the Partnership's response to the competitive Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for the Continuum of Care Homeless Assistance Program (CoC) through the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The CoC encouraged the establishment of a 10-year plan to end chronic homelessness within its annual application. The Partnership, therefore, developed a 10-year strategy through the 10 Year Planning Committee and sub groups for ending chronic homelessness that establishes specific action steps to achieve the objectives in alignment with the requirements of the NOFA.

The 10-Year Strategy to End Homelessness in San Bernardino County initially included 25 recommendations to assist the Partnership in its efforts to address homelessness in the county. The 10-Year Strategy to End Homelessness in San Bernardino County was presented at various public forums throughout the county in 2009 for public input. The Partnership also presented the Strategy to the BOS, who then adopted a resolution (No. 2009-187) in support of the Strategy.

On April 2013, an evaluation of the Strategy "Recalibrating for Results" was overseen by the San Bernardino County Homeless Provider Network (HPN) committee chairs in cooperation with the OHS and the Institute for Urban Initiatives. The report provide an update to the 10-Year Strategy to End Homelessness in San Bernardino County and was presented to ICH on April 24, 2013. The ICH unanimously approved the results with amendments.

The report noted that the Partnership completed, or partially completed several of the 25 recommendations. As a result, the HPN Committee proposed that some of the original recommendations be continued, expanded upon, or folded into 15 new recommendations. The Committee also recommended that some recommendations be eliminated because they were accomplished or no longer needed. The following are the updated recommendations as noted in the recalibrated report:

- Recommendation 1: Adopt and Implement a Housing First Model
- Recommendation 2: Implement Community Outreach, Engagement, and Treatment for Chronically Homeless Individuals and Families
- Recommendation 3: Obtain Shelter Plus Care Certificates
- Recommendation 4: Increase Permanent Supportive Housing Beds
- Recommendation 5: Carry out Veterans Affairs Supported Housing (VASH) Vouchers
- Recommendation 6: Implement Rapid Re-housing Strategy

Moving Forward to Action

- Recommendation 7: Target Homeless Prevention Resources and Services
- Recommendation 8: Implement a Community Outreach and Education Campaign concerning at-risk of homelessness
- Recommendation 9: Formalize protocols and improve the coordination of discharge planning
- Recommendation 10: Ensure access to Mainstream Resources
- Recommendation 11: Expand Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)
- Recommendation 12: Conduct periodic Homelessness 101 Training concerning community issues
- Recommendation 13: Implement Coordinated Assessment and Access System
- Recommendation 14: Increase Permanent Affordable Housing
- Recommendation 15: Increase opportunities for employment

According to many leading global management firms, often public or private-based organizations are able to craft successful strategies that identify overarching frameworks for addressing key internal and external issues to guide the organization in a proper direction.¹ The problem arises in the implementation of these strategies. Strategies are useful guides for providing a foundation to help move an organization from where it's at to where it wants to be within a specific time period. A strategy is a solution to a problem, but does not necessarily dictate the steps on how to arrive to the solution. A plan describes the steps needed to move an organization from where it is now to where it wants to be as stated in its strategy. Essentially, a strategy is what you want to accomplish as an organization and a plan details how you will accomplish it.

According to the CEO Challenge Survey, only half of all global companies has a formal plan developed to realize its overall outcomes.² One of the key concerns raised by many of our Partnership members is how do we measure the success of the 10-Year Strategy to End Homelessness in San Bernardino County. The problem arises in the fact that the current recommendations are what we need to have in place in order to address homelessness within the county; however there is no clear action steps, short-, medium-, or long-term, that are drafted to get us there. In order to move forward we need to enable our strategies through planning and asset mapping in order to establish deliverables for performance measurement.

In order to address, the need from specific planning steps needed to meet the desired outcomes as stated in the Strategy, the Office of Homeless Services is seeking direction from the Interagency Council to move forward with the development of a 10-Year Strategy Planning document that will detail key actions needed to accomplish our Strategy including tasks, activities, groups responsible, and expected, specific measurable outcomes. This will require a consultant to assist with the planning processes and commitment from Partnership members in the nominal group process. Also, OHS is formally requesting to reevaluation the Policy Ad Hoc Committee for potential permanency.

Family Stabilization Program



WELFARE-TO-WORK (WTW)

Background of Family Stabilization (FS)



- Family Stabilization (FS) is a new component of the CalWORKs program that provides intensive case management and services to customers who meet the criteria set forth in Assembly Bill (AB) 74.
- Welfare-to-Work (WTW) customers and family members living in the household may be served if a family is experiencing an identified situation and/or crisis that is destabilizing the family and would interfere with a WTW customer's ability to participate in WTW activities and services.

What is Family Stabilization?



Provides intensive case management (daily/weekly contact) and services to customers who meet certain criteria.

- **Designed to:**
 - Ensure a basic level of stability within a family prior to, or concurrently with, participation in Welfare-to-Work (WTW) activities.
 - Increase customer success in light of the flexible WTW 24-Month Time Clock through more intensive case management and the assignment of customers to the additional activities or barrier removal services necessary to ultimately achieve self-sufficiency.
- **Provided at any point in the WTW Program as long as the Assistance Unit (AU) contains an eligible adult with time remaining on his/her WTW 24-Month Time Clock.**
 - FS participation will stop a customer's WTW 24-Month Time Clock for a cumulative total of six months. The clock will not stop for the customer's CalWORKs 48-Month Time Limit.

Goal of FS



- Address the issues of the Work-Eligible Individual (WEI) and his/her family members to ensure a basic level of stability prior to, or concurrently with, the customer's participation in WTW activities, and
- Assist the WEI customer to achieve self-sufficiency.

Phase I Services



- **Mental Health Services**
- **Substance Abuse Services**
- **Domestic Violence Services**
- **Assistance with temporary/permanent housing**

Phase II Services



Phase Two is a parallel effort to expand FS services. Other services will include, but are not limited to assistance with:

- **Court Related Issues**
 - Expungement
 - Court Ordered classes – Parenting/Anger Management/DUI
 - Pending court cases
 - License – regain (child support hold), fees and fines (tickets)
- **Various Needs**
 - Car seats
 - Tattoo removal – ARMC and others
- **County Schools/Community Colleges**
 - HSD/GED – Online options, resource rooms

A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is currently being drafted with Arrowhead Regional Medical Center (ARMC) to provide tattoo removal services.

Population Served



- CalWORKs cases that contain individuals who are required to participate in the Welfare-to-Work (WTW) Program are eligible for Family Stabilization (FS) services.
- FS services are not limited to the aided or work eligible adult and should address FS issues of children in the AU and ineligible unaided AU members.

Collaboration with DBH



A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was developed with the Department of Behavioral Health (DBH) to provide intensive case management services ranging from daily to weekly contact with the customer to address family needs related to:

- Domestic Violence,
- Mental Health issues,
- Substance Abuse issues, and
- Homelessness, using DBH's Rapid Re-Housing Program.
