Adult Crisis Residential (40-49)	Therapeutic or rehabilitative services provided in a non-institutional residential setting which provides a structured program as an alternative to hospitalization for persons experiencing an acute psychiatric episode or crisis who do not present medical complications requiring nursing care.
Jail Inpatient (50-59)	A distinct unit within an adult or juvenile detention facility which is staffed to provide intensive psychiatric treatment of inmates.
Residential, Other (60-64)	This service function includes children's residential programs, former SB 155 programs, former Community Care Facility (CCF) augmentation, and other residential programs that are not Medi-Cal certified or defined elsewhere.

Service activities are provided as a package and include but are not limited to Crisis Intervention, Assessment, Evaluation, Collateral, Medication Support Services, and Therapy.
Vocational Services (30-39)	Services designed to encourage and facilitate individual motivation and focus upon realistic and attainable vocational goals. To the extent possible, the intent is to maximize individual client involvement in skill seeking and skill enhancement, with an ultimate goal of self-support.
Socialization (40-49)	Services designed to provide activities for persons who require structured support and the opportunity to develop the skills necessary to move toward more independent functioning.
SNF Augmentation (60-69)	Organized therapeutic activities which augment and are integrated into an existing skilled nursing facility.
Day Treatment Intensive Half Day (81-84) Full Day(85-89)	Day Treatment Intensive service provides an organized and structured multi-disciplinary treatment program as an alternative to hospitalization, to avoid placement in a more restrictive setting, or to maintain the client in a community setting.
Day Rehabilitation Half Day (91-94) Full Day (95-99)	Day Rehabilitation service provides evaluation and therapy to maintain or restore personal independence and functioning consistent with requirements for learning and development.

Outpatient Services/Mode 15

Linkage/Brokerage (01-09)	Linkage/Brokerage services are activities that assist a client to access medical, educational, social, prevocational, vocational, rehabilitative, or other needed community services.

	A Client Record and a Key Change Record are uniquely identified by the Client Key. A Service Record is uniquely identified by the Client Key and a unique Record Reference Number. A Periodic Record is uniquely identified by the Client Key and the Date Completed.
Client Record	One of the five types of records reported to the CSI system. The information in the Client Record uniquely describes the client receiving service. It is reported once, at the first contact with each county, and may be corrected as needed.
	The other four types of records reported to the CSI system are the Control Record, the Key Change Record, the Periodic Record, and the Service Record.
Control Record	One of the five types of records reported to the CSI system. One Control Record is submitted with each batch submission file. The information in the Control Record uniquely describes the submission file.
	The other four types of records reported to the CSI system are the Client Record, the Key Change Record, the Periodic Record, and the Service Record.
County/City/Mental Health Plan	An entity which enters into an agreement with DMH to provide public mental health services. The mental health plan may be a county, counties acting jointly, or another governmental or non-governmental entity.
CSI (Client and Service Information)	The Client and Service Information system replaces the Client Data System (CDS) and the Institute for Mental Disease (IMD) reporting. All persons served in treatment programs must be reported to the CSI system. The CSI system contains the information to meet state and federal reporting requirements for client based information regarding persons served by county/city/mental health plans.
DHS (Department of Health Services)	As the single state agency for Medicaid in California, DHS is responsible to the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) for the oversight of all Medi-Cal activities.

ICD-9-CM (International Classification of Diseases, 9th Revision, Clinical Modification)	Modification developed in the United States based on the official version of the World Health Organization's <i>International Classification of</i> <i>Diseases, 9th Revision</i> , and designed for classification of morbidity and mortality information for statistical reporting purposes and information retrieval.
Key Change Record	One of the five types of records reported to the CSI system. The Key Change Record is used to: 1) change a County Client Number (CCN); 2) change Service and Periodic Records on the CSI Master database from one or more CCN(s) to a different CCN; or 3) merge two or more CCN's on the CSI Master database into one CCN.
	The other four types of records reported to the CSI system are the Client Record, the Control Record, the Periodic Record, and the Service Record.
Medi-Cal	California's Medicaid Program.
Medicaid	The federal and state program that provides federal reimbursement to states for the costs of medical care for the poor and disabled.

Phase I Consolidation	Non-Short-Doyle/Medi-Cal (SD/MC) hospitals. There are small differences in the type of information reported for the various types of services; for example, 24-hour mode of service, outpatient, etc. The other four types of records reported to the CSI system are the Client Record, the Control Record, the Key Change Record, and the Periodic Record.
Specialty Mental Health Services	The specialty mental health services (also called Phase II Consolidation) which were reimbursed in the FFS/MC program are the professional services provided by individual or group practice psychiatrists; psychologists; Licensed Clinical Social Workers (LCSW's); Marriage, Family, and Child Counselors (MFCC's); and Registered Nurses (RN's); as well as the Mixed Specialty group practices. Clients must meet specific diagnostic criteria. In SD/MC, the specialty mental health services include: 1) psychiatric inpatient hospital services; 2) rehabilitative services, which include a full range of non-hospital services; and 3) case management.
SSN (Social Security Number)	The number assigned by the U.S. Social Security Administration, to maintain permanent and accurate earnings records of persons working in employment covered by the Social Security Program.

APPENDIX B: FIELDS FOR DHS TO BE COMPLETED BY DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH

B-1. PROVIDER NAME

PURPOSE: Identifies the name of the organization providing the reported service.

COMMENTS: This data element is required by the Department of Health Services and is a 28-character field. The Department of Mental Health will obtain this information from the Provider File using the data element Provider Number.

B-2. PROVIDER TYPE CODE

PURPOSE: Identifies the type of organization providing the reported service.

COMMENTS: This data element is required by the Department of Health Services and is a twocharacter field. The Department of Mental Health will obtain this information from the Provider File using the data element Provider Number.

B-3. ZIP CODE OF PROVIDER

PURPOSE: Identifies the zip code of the provider.

COMMENTS: This data element is required by the Department of Health Services and is a fivenumeric field. The Department of Mental Health will obtain this information from the Provider File using the data element Provider Number.

B-4. COUNTY CODE OF PROVIDER

PURPOSE: Identifies the county location of the provider.

COMMENTS: This data element is required by the Department of Health Services and is a two-numeric field. The Department of Mental Health will obtain this information from the Provider File using the data element Provider Number and Zip Code of Provider.

B-5. PROGRAM CODE

PURPOSE: Identifies the mental health records from the other records in the Department of Health Services database.

COMMENTS: This data element is required by the Department of Health Services and is a one-character field.

B-6. CLAIM REFERENCE NUMBER

- **PURPOSE:** Identifies the unique number built by the Department of Mental Health for any record being forwarded to the Department of Health Services.
- **COMMENTS:** This data element is required by the Department of Health Services and is a 13-digit field. The first four characters indicate the Julian date, including a single digit year indicator, on which the record was received. The last nine characters will be assigned by the Department of Mental Health.

PURPOSE: A "place holder" for this item has been established for possible future use.

APPENDIX D: CALIFORNIA PLACE NAMES

PURPOSE:

Appendix D is a comprehensive list of place names in California that enables cross-referencing the names of incorporated cities, places within incorporated cities, and unincorporated places with the names of the counties in which they are located. This allows ease of identifying the county name and reporting the two-digit county code associated with the place a client was born in California. (See Field Number C-04.0, PLACE OF BIRTH).

COMMENTS:

If an identical or nearly identical place name occurs in more than one county, it would be necessary to ask the client additional questions to determine in which county he or she was born.

- Example 1: The place name Alder Springs is found in both Fresno and Glenn Counties. Ask the client whether he or she was born in Northern California (for Glenn County) or in the San Joaquin Valley (for Fresno County).
- Example 2: The place name Agua Caliente is found in Sonoma County while Agua Caliente Springs is found in San Diego County. Ask the client if he or she was born in the San Francisco Bay Area (for Sonoma County) or in Southern California (for San Diego County).
