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INTRODUCTION

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INTRODUCTION

CONGRATULATIONS!

If you are reading this resource guide, chances are that you have weathered some of the emotional highs and lows of the adoption process and have succeeded in adding to your family with the help of San Bernardino County Children and Family Services (CFS).

Adoption is a lifelong process filled with joys and challenges. In addition to your personal reserves of love, patience and understanding, it is likely that you may need additional help at some point or another.

This is why a special program was created to serve families built through adoption with CFS. The Post Adoption Services (PAS) program provides support for families long after the adoption is finalized.

This resource guide informs you about CFS's PAS. It also explains the benefits available through the federal AAP and the state Medi-Cal program.

Finally, this guide directs you to resources that provide services to children and families, especially those built through adoption.

POST ADOPTION SERVICES

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POST ADOPTION SERVICES (PAS) OVERVIEW

Adoption is a lifelong process that changes the lives of everyone involved. PAS workers are available to all San Bernardino County CFS adoptive families after the finalization of their adoption. The PAS team is made up of social workers, clerical staff and eligibility workers. PAS workers provide support to all members of the adoption triad: Adoptees, adoptive families and birth families. PAS workers also provide information regarding the following:

- Community resources
- Recent literature about adoption
- Medical resources and the Medi-Cal Program
- Advocacy resources
- Crisis counseling resources
- Mental health resources
- Assistance to adoptive families experiencing adoption-related crises
- Adoption Assistance Program (AAP)
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI) referrals
- Applying for financial aid for college

THE PAS WORKER MAY ALSO:

- Provide non-identifying information about the adoptive family to birth families when agreed upon by both parties.
- Arrange reconnections between “consenting” adoptees age 18 and older with consenting birth family members.
- Assist Native American adoptees with tribal enrollment.
- Help adoptive families with AAP reassessments for adjustments to their AAP benefits.

There are no fees for CFS Post Adoption Services; however, agencies to which you may be referred may charge for their services.

SERVICES OFFERED

INFORMATION SERVICES

San Bernardino County CFS has been providing adoption services since 1951, and every adoption case processed since then is permanently stored. Adoptees may call PAS (909-891-3300) to get their birth family history anytime in their lives. If consents are signed by all applicable parties, identifying information may be provided.

If consents are not signed, no specific identifying information can be given, but the PAS worker may provide non-identifying information, such as the adoptee's birth information, a physical description of the birth parents, the birth parent's medical history and the circumstances of the decision for adoption.

Birth families may also contact a PAS worker to add information to their files, such as photographs, medical histories and even letters addressed to their birth children.

RECONNECTIONS

PAS workers also facilitate reconnections between adoptees and birth families. Birth parents or siblings who want to be contacted by the adoptee can sign a consent for arranging contact (for birth parents) or waiver of confidentiality (for siblings). The consents will be on file in the event the adoptee contacts PAS in the future and wants to have a reconnection with the birth family. The reconnection between the adoptee and the birth parent or birth sibling can only be arranged if both parties have consents on file.

When an adoptee is 18 years old, he/she can also sign a consent for arranging contact. This gives PAS permission to arrange a meeting (if one is requested) between the adoptee and the birth parents.

If the birth sibling is signing the consent, he/she must also be at least 18 years of age.

Consents for arranging contact and waivers of confidentiality must be signed in the presence of a notary or a representative of a licensed or county adoption agency.

NATIVE AMERICAN TRIBAL ENROLLMENT

Licensed or county adoption agencies must assist adult adoptees of Native American heritage with enrollment into their tribes. When an adult adoptee requests help with tribal enrollment, the PAS worker gets information from the adoption case record and sends it to the appropriate tribal enrollment office. If enrollment is authorized by the tribe, the tribe will send the adoptee a certificate of enrollment.



ADOPTION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (AAP) AND MEDICAL

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ADOPTION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM AND MEDI-CAL

ADOPTION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (AAP)

The AAP is a federal program providing financial assistance for adopted children and children adopted through Tribal Customary Adoption. Most adopted children who were dependents of the court qualify for AAP benefits.

The adoptive child is eligible to receive AAP benefits until age 18. Under certain circumstances, AAP benefits may be extended beyond age 18 to 21. You may call a PAS worker for further details. AAP benefits will also pay for up to 12-18 months in a licensed residential treatment facility if the child meets certain criteria and the parents participate in the program. Youths can only be placed in a licensed residential treatment facility in the same state as adoptive parent.

The PAS worker assists families who are requesting an increase or a specialized Adoption Assistance benefit rate for their children. Specialized rates or increases require documentation, such as medical or professional assessment/diagnosis, or other verification of need. The PAS worker informs the family of the type of documentation needed and prepares the case for administrative review for possible increases.

For assistance with AAP, call (909) 891-3300 to speak with a PAS worker. For assistance with Medi-Cal, call your eligibility worker or see the Medi-Cal section of this resource guide on page 12.

AAP GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE AND STATE HEARING

An adoptive family that disagrees with the determined AAP benefit amount may contest the decision or apply for a state hearing.

The family should first discuss the issue with their child's CFS adoption social worker (before adoption finalization), or PAS worker (if the adoption is final). If an agreement is not reached, the social worker will consult with their supervisor. If the situation remains unresolved, the supervisor will consult with the Child Welfare Services Manager (CWSM). If the request is denied by the CWSM, the family will receive a Notice of Action by mail confirming the denial. This notice explains the reason for the decision and provides information on the right to appeal. If the family remains dissatisfied, they may request a state hearing. Instructions for requesting a hearing are printed on the back of the Notice of Action. To request a state hearing by phone, call (800) 743-8525. ***The request for the state hearing must be made within 90 days, starting the day after the County provided or mailed the Notice of Action.***

MEDI-CAL

All children who qualify for AAP benefits are also eligible for health care services through the Medi-Cal program. Not all doctors or medical providers accept Medi-Cal, but there are physicians and medical providers in every community that do. Medi-Cal can also be used for out-patient or in-patient mental health services, if necessary.

Although it is not mandatory, adoptive parents may also choose to enroll the child in a Medi-Cal Managed Care Plan. If they do so, it is important for adoptive parents to choose a plan that can meet their child's physical and mental health needs. The family may consult with their social worker, PAS worker and eligibility worker as to the advantages and disadvantages of a Medi-Cal Managed Care Plan enrollment. If the adoptive family has private medical insurance, and the child is enrolled in the family's insurance, Medi-Cal is billed as the secondary provider.

If the family decides to move out of state, they are advised to contact their assigned eligibility worker as soon as possible. The eligibility worker will provide information regarding federal or non-federal eligibility. If they are not eligible to receive Medicaid benefits, PAS will assist the family in obtaining medical coverage for the child in the new state. The family may also consider enrolling the child in a private insurance plan.

For general questions regarding Medi-Cal and private insurance, call your eligibility worker.

For discontinuance questions, call a PAS worker or your assigned eligibility worker.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

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FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

CAN FAMILIES CALL PAS FOR HELP AS SOON AS THE ADOPTION FINALIZES?

Since the adoption social worker is the person most familiar with the case, they are the best person to call if there are problems (within six months) after the adoption is finalized. After six months, PAS workers are available to help. The phone number for PAS is (909) 891-3300.

I WAS ADOPTED. HOW DO I GET INFORMATION ABOUT MY ADOPTION AND MY BIRTH PARENTS?

CDSS or the adoption agency that processed the adoption can provide information on birth parents to adoptees. The information provided includes general facts about the birth parents and their medical history. If consents are signed by all applicable parties, more detailed, identifying information can be provided. This service is available only for adoptions that were finalized in California. Some licensed private adoption agencies may charge a fee for this service. You must request this information by writing directly to the adoption agency, if known, or to CDSS at the following address:

If you do not know the name of the adoption agency who processed the adoption, you can request the name from CDSS. Your letter must include your name, birth date, place of birth, and the full names of both of your adoptive parents. Also, your signature must be notarized by a Notary Public. This service is not available through email.

AS AN ADULT ADOPTEE, HOW CAN I MAKE CONTACT WITH MY BIRTH PARENTS?

California has a Mutual Consent Program that is administered by either the CDSS or the adoption agency that handled the adoption. In addition to the Mutual Consent Program, the Adoptions Information Act applies to adoptions in which the birth parents signed the relinquishment for adoption or consent to adoption, or in which the birth parents' rights were involuntarily terminated by court action on or after January 1, 1984.

MUTUAL CONSENT PROGRAM:

An adoptee may complete a Consent for Arranging Contact (**AD 902**), and submit it to the CDSS or the adoption agency that handled the adoption, if known. Once the CDSS or the adoption agency receives a consent form from both the adult adoptee (18 years of age or older) and from his/her birth parent(s), designated identifying information can be disclosed to both parties so they may contact one another. The law prohibits the CDSS and the adoption agencies from soliciting or requesting consent and/or providing search services for adoptees or birth parents.

ADOPTIONS INFORMATION ACT:

An adult adoptee (age 21 or older) may complete an Adoptions Information Act Statement (**AD 908A**) requesting disclosure of the name and address of his or her birth parent(s). CDSS or the adoption agency that handled the adoption may disclose the name and address of the birth parent(s), if the birth parent signed a relinquishment or consent for adoption, or the parent's rights were involuntarily terminated by court action on or after January 1, 1984, and the birth parent signed an Adoptions Information Act Statement (**AD 908**) granting permission for such disclosure.

BIRTH CERTIFICATES/ ORDER OF ADOPTION/SOCIAL SECURITY CARDS

CAN THE ADOPTEE HAVE A COPY OF THE ORIGINAL BIRTH CERTIFICATE?

No, the original birth certificate is sealed because it contains confidential identifying information. It is at the court's discretion whether to unseal the original birth certificate. The adoptive family or the adoptee may, however, receive an amended birth certificate that does not contain identifying information.

HOW DO THE ADOPTIVE PARENTS OR ADOPTEE GET A COPY OF THE AMENDED BIRTH CERTIFICATE?

If it has been three months since your child's adoption was finalized and you have not received the child's new (amended) birth certificate, contact the Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) at the following location:

HOW DO ADOPTIVE PARENTS GET ADDITIONAL COPIES OF THE ADOPT 215: ADOPTION ORDER?

You will receive your legal documents—Adoption Agreement (**ADOPT-210**), Adoption Order (**ADOPT-215**) and Termination of Dependency (**JV 364**) from your social worker after the adoption. Please keep them in a safe place. If they are lost or damaged, the process to replace them is difficult and time consuming. You can contact a PAS worker for information on how to do so. If your adoption is finalized in Superior Court, contact that court for a copy of your order.

HOW DO ADOPTIVE PARENTS REPORT THEIR ADOPTION TO SOCIAL SECURITY?

In order to process a name change or request a new Social Security Number for your adoptive child, you will need to take a copy of your Adoption Agreement (**ADOPT-210**) and Adoption Order (**ADOPT-215**) and a copy of your child's amended birth certificate to a Social Security office. For an office near you, call (800) 772-1213. For tax purposes, if your child does not yet have a Social Security Number, contact the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) to request an Adoption Taxpayer Identification Number (ATIN).

CAN I GET REIMBURSED FOR THE FEES I INCUR?

Yes, you may be reimbursed for the fees you pay through the Adoption Assistance Program (AAP) Non-Recurring Adoption Expense Reimbursement Program. Contact your social worker if you are not familiar with the process.

AAP FINANCIAL

IF THE ADOPTIVE FAMILY MOVES, WILL THEY CONTINUE TO RECEIVE AAP BENEFITS?

Yes, the adoptive family will continue to receive AAP benefits for the adoptive child if they move. However, it is very important for parents to notify their eligibility worker of their change of address to ensure payments continue without a problem.

WHO SHOULD ADOPTIVE PARENTS CALL IF THEY DO NOT RECEIVE THE AAP PAYMENT OR IF THERE IS A PROBLEM WITH THE CHILD'S MEDI-CAL?

Families should call their eligibility worker handling their AAP payments.

Note: Families should give their payments 10 business days to be delivered.

WHAT HAPPENS TO THE AAP PAYMENTS IF THE ADOPTIVE PARENTS DIE?

The AAP is based on an agreement between CFS and the adoptive parent; if the adoption was a single parent adoption, the AAP payment stops. If the adoptive parent paid into Social Security, the child then becomes eligible for Social Security death benefits. The child may also be eligible for Supplemental Security Income benefits. If the child was adopted by two parents, the surviving parent should contact Post Adoptive Services and request a change in payee. If the adoptive parent(s) dies and the child or young adult is adopted by another parent(s), the adoptee becomes eligible for AAP benefits again.

WILL AAP BENEFITS AFFECT THE ADOPTIVE PARENTS' TAXES OR ELIGIBILITY FOR OTHER PROGRAMS?

AAP benefits are not taxable income. If the adoptive parents are applying for benefits from other state or federal programs, the AAP income must be reported. The administrators of the program will determine if benefits will be affected. Adoptive parents should contact their tax professionals for other considerations.

WILL ADOPTION ASSISTANCE BENEFITS BE DISCONTINUED AFTER TWO YEARS?

The AAP benefits are reassessed every two years. Paperwork should be returned promptly to be in compliance with reassessment requirements.

WILL THE ADOPTIVE PARENTS CONTINUE TO RECEIVE ADOPTION ASSISTANCE BENEFITS FOR THEIR CHILD IF THE FAMILY MOVES OUT OF THE COUNTRY?

Yes, eligibility for Adoption Assistance is not based on where the adoptive family lives. They may move out of the county, the state or the country, and the benefits will remain consistent.

WHAT IF THE ADOPTED CHILD NEEDS SPECIAL SERVICES AND THE FAMILY CANNOT AFFORD THEM?

If new medical or mental health needs arise following the adoption, the family may request an increase in AAP benefits. Documentation must be submitted by the family showing the child's needs. If the adopted child has a disability, the child may also be eligible to receive California Children's Services and may be eligible to receive Regional Center Services. These two programs are California programs and will be discontinued if the family leaves the state of California.

WHAT ARE REGIONAL CENTER SERVICES?

The Department of Developmental Services is responsible for designing and coordinating a wide array of services for California residents with developmental disabilities. Regional Centers help plan, access, coordinate, and monitor these services and supports. You may locate a Regional Center near you by visiting www.arcnet.org.

HOW DOES A FAMILY FIND MEDI-CAL MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES?

The Department of Behavioral Health (DBH) screens for mental health needs and gives referrals to contact agencies and DBH clinics. Usually, after the telephone screening, the family must go to a DBH clinic for an intake assessment that begins services. Child psychiatrists at DBH assess children for medication and provide ongoing care when needed.

HOW DOES A FAMILY FIND MENTAL HEALTH MEDI-CAL SERVICES IN OTHER CALIFORNIA COUNTIES?

Senate Bill (SB) 785 facilitates the receipt of medically necessary specialty mental health services by a child who is placed outside of his/her county of origin.

If a parent is concerned that his/her child has difficulty learning in school due to a possible disability, he/she may contact the Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) provider in his/her school district. The parent should take the initiative to write a letter to the child's school stating he/she would like the child assessed for a disability. The school should then conduct tests to see if the child qualifies for any type of assistance. After the assessment is completed and it is determined that the child does have a disability, an Individual Educational Plan (IEP) meeting must be scheduled within 45 days. During this meeting, the people involved will discuss what services can and will be offered to help the child.
