

A WORD FROM THE SHERIFF

The annual report provides an outlet for me to proudly share the accomplishments of the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department and gives me the opportunity to reflect on how blessed I am to be the sheriff of San Bernardino County. Despite these challenging economic times, the men and women of this department continue to provide an unparalleled level of service to the residents and visitors of San Bernardino County.

A key component to maintaining quality service during a time when resources are scarce is technology. The Sheriff's Department revolutionized its technological advancements over the past year, giving deputies and detectives the tools needed to complete thorough investigations in the field and thus becoming a regional leader in law enforcement technology.

In 2011 Technical Services implemented upgrades in an effort to automate our criminal investigations workflow. The goal was to be paperless from the time a report is taken through the court filing process. Patrol cars were outfitted with removable rugged laptops and detectives were issued iPads. These advancements allow department personnel to remain in the field by giving them the technology needed to conduct investigations and complete reports from their vehicles.

The department successfully launched the PreSynct Report Writing System at all stations and divisions. The entire system now automates the writing, typing, approval, statistical entry, copying, transportation and imaging portion of the report-writing process. PreSynct provides automated workflow across this expansive county with 'real time' sharing of information. As soon as a report is in the system it becomes available to other investigators and administrators with the proper access.

In mid-2011, the Specialized Investigations Division added a state-of-the-art 3D laser scanning system to the department's technological arsenal. The Leica ScanStation C10 3D laser scanning system was purchased with \$180,000 grant awarded by a local Law and Justice Group. The Leica ScanStation measures everything in its field of view in vivid 3D and allows scenes to be precisely scanned, photographed and measured. The effectiveness of this technology will reduce the amount of time it takes to document and measure a crime scene, thus providing overall cost-savings to the residents of San Bernardino County.

The San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department also launched its own interactive magazine, "Ten-8." Sheriff - Coroner

SHERIFF-CORONER ACCREDITATION

The San Bernardino County Sheriff-Coroner's Department holds the sole distinction of receiving national accreditation for its expert evaluations and quality death investigations.

In August of 2011, our county sheriff-coroner department became the first law enforcement agency in the country to receive accreditation from the National Association of Medical Examiners (NAME), and remains the only sheriff-coroner system in the United States to do so.

Sheriff-Coroner Rod Hoops expressed pride in his being the first and only department of its type to receive the accreditation. But, more importantly, he acknowledged what the accreditation means to the citizens we serve.

This accreditation "signifies to the public that the Coroner Division is performing at a high level of confidence," he said.

The San Bernardino Sheriffs-Coroner Department has been working toward accreditation since 2007, two years after the Sheriff's Department and Coroner's Office merged. The process included rigorous evaluation of the division's policies and procedures, facilities, and staffing-to-output ratios. The review includes all supportive services, including toxicology, odontology, and forensic anthropology. In all, the inspection team evaluated more than 240 areas throughout the division.

NAME granted provisional accreditation to the department in January 2010, after several rounds of policy and procedure review and facility evaluations, but would not grant full accreditation until the division met NAME's target ratio of annual autopsies per doctor. As it was, the coroner division had too many autopsies being performed on average per doctor. NAME wanted a lower ratio per physician. With the hiring of Dr. Dennis Rhee, the division was able to show a decline in the ratio, and NAME granted the certification.

NAME offers its accreditation program to further its mission to improve the quality of death investigations nationally. The accreditation is voluntary, intended to provide expert evaluations and to offer recommendations for improvement to those who participate.



SHERIFF'S POLICE ACTIVITIES LEAGUE

PAL is a national program created specifically to bridge the gap between youth and local law enforcement officers. In California there are dozens of PAL programs, ranging in activities from boxing to softball. The San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department PAL programs were started with the goal of connecting to the community and overcoming the typical stereotype that far too many kids have of cops. The official PAL motto is "The bond between cops and kids."

Lieutenant Matt Schilling, who volunteers at the Hesperia PAL Boxing Club, said teaching kids boxing techniques comes second to forming a rapport with them. "One of the primary goals of the program itself is to help disprove the perception that cops are these untouchable law enforcers and show these kids that we are indeed human beings too, with feelings and emotions," Schilling said. "We have a genuine willingness to make a difference in the community." That willingness is made evident by the sheer number of hours deputies donate to ensure the programs are successful.

Various PAL programs in the county are run independently of each other but all offer the same basic structure: Participants arrive in proper attire, with a willingness to work hard. They are led in warm-up activities and stretches to ready them for the strenuous workout to come. Once their heart rates are significantly raised, the kids have the choice to work on hand pads, cardio, speed bag, heavy bag or jump rope. Those who are ready are ushered into the ring for sparring sessions.



Often, it is a deputy in the corner tying their gloves, adjusting their headgear or giving advice on how to avoid their opponent's right cross.

The deputies not only provide support but work out alongside the participants. But time in the ring is just the beginning of what is needed to run a successful program. Deputy Paul Gallant, of Victorville, runs his station's program. His duties include interviewing kids for the program, setting up rosters, continuous fundraising and making sure all equipment is ordered and in proper working order. He also keeps track of the kids' grades and attendance. Failing grades and truan- cies suspend participation. In order to get back on track, PAL provides mentoring.

The pay might be lousy but the rewards of volunteering for PAL are priceless, deputies said. Jeff Farrar, who runs the Hesperia PAL program, said he enjoys watching the progress of the kids. Not only do their boxing skills improve but their self-esteem and discipline increase as well. PAL is a partnership between law enforcement and the community that benefits all who are involved. "I am very, very impressed with [the deputies'] dedication and determination to ensure the kids we have in the program follow a certain path," Schilling said. "A lot of these deputies have taken a personal interest in the kids and have counseled them on personal time. It reaches out even further than the PAL center."

SHERIFF'S JUVENILE INTERVENTION PROGRAM

The San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department Juvenile Intervention Program exists to address the criminal activities of our county's youth and the associated problems of delinquency, defiance and family dynamics that cause grief and disruption in the home and the community.

Our approach to solving – or at least alleviating – these problems is to take at-risk juveniles who have been referred to the program on guided tours of county jail facilities. While there, the participants are made to wear jail garb, eat jail food and see, first hand, the unglamorous life of an inmate. The youth are confronted with inmates who take them to task for their delinquency and share their own life experiences, which highlight the small yet life-changing decisions that led them to a life of crime. Many inmates acknowledge their poor choices in life, beginning with disrespecting their parents, dabbling in drug use and idolizing the gang life.

This is not a “Scared Straight” program in the usual sense of the term: the emphasis is not on terrorizing the participants, but on familiarizing them with the long-term consequences of their delinquent behavior. The hope is this 8-hour program will open the eyes of still-impressionable youth and encourage them to take a more productive path in life.

Tours are conducted twice a month. To make the program as comprehensive as possible, JIP officials conduct informational sessions for the parents while the juveniles are going through the jail facilities. These sessions – composed of live and videotaped segments --offer parents vital help in the struggle to rein in their rebellious sons and daughters. Parents are given a packet of resources to use in the case their kids have a drug or alcohol addiction, or need some other form of counseling. Program facilitators follow-up with parents after one and three months to check on the progress of the participants. The program seeks to educate all members of the family in how to move forward in a healthy and productive manner.

To date, results of the JIP effort have been overwhelming: the word has gotten out to the public, and many distraught parents are calling JIP to place their youngsters in the program. In fact, the program has a waiting list. The JIP program also garnered the attention of the network A&E, which has now filmed three episodes about our JIP program. These hour-long shows can be seen on the network's series entitled “Beyond Scared Straight.” The program follow-up efforts are in process, and records are being kept. Preliminary results indicate that all involved – judges, educators, parents, kids – are benefiting from the Juvenile Intervention Program.



VOLUNTEERS MAKE US POSSIBLE

Believe it or not, there are 108 units within just *one* division of the Sheriff's Department: the Volunteer Forces Unit. These variegated units include such vital groups as Search & Rescue, Mounted Enforcement, Citizens on Patrol, Explorer Scouts, the Chaplain Corps, the Medical Reserve Corps, Peace Officer Reserves, and many, many more. If you add up all these units you get a combined total of 1,909 volunteers – almost half the number of people in the entire Sheriff's Department -- ranging in age from 14 to 86. Obviously this contingent of people makes up a crucial, irreplaceable part of our agency, and their value to the department is beyond question. As sheriffs throughout the years have stated and restated: we could not do our jobs without our volunteers.

In one of the most recent developments in the world of volunteers, an ICS (Incident Command System) Team was created in 2011, which is designed to assist all our stations with critical incidents, including Search & Rescue missions. To date, the ICS Team has responded to Mutual Aid calls in Kern, Inyo, Riverside and San Diego Counties. In these locales the team has successfully helped coordinate and manage large scale search assignments.

The value of our volunteers is, in many respects, immeasurable. But if you were to calculate all the hours put in by these generous citizens in calendar year 2011, you'd find that they had given 523,831 hours of their lives to helping the people of San Bernardino County. That number, multiplied by an average wage of \$23.29 an hour, means a cost-savings of \$12,200,024 to those same citizens of the county. Put another way, a five year average of volunteer hours is 550,089.4, for a savings in that period of \$64,057,910 – an average annual savings of \$12,811,582.

Any way you slice it, the volunteers of the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department are making a tremendous contribution to their community and their neighbors. Our volunteer programs are models for other programs nationally; in fact, many of our volunteers serve on national and even international committees. The department is extremely proud of the effort put forth by its hundreds of volunteers, and very thankful indeed for the wonderful job they do.



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
