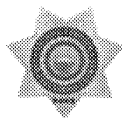

NARRATIVE

On Saturday, July 16, 2022, at approximately 2343 hours, Deputy Marcus Mason was dispatched [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga, to investigate a reported suspicious vehicle. At approximately 2356 hours, Mason arrived and contacted the occupant, later identified as Nicholas Campbell. During the contact, Campbell produced a handgun, shot Mason multiple times, and a lethal force encounter (LFE) occurred. Campbell fled on foot, but was detained a short distance away. Detectives from the Specialized Investigations Division, Homicide Detail responded and assumed the investigation.

On Saturday, July 16, 2022, at approximately 2343 hours, [REDACTED] who lived at the [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga, called Sheriff's Dispatch and reported a small gray sedan was parked in front of his residence for approximately two hours. [REDACTED] explained the vehicle's hazard lights were activated and the driver, later identified as Nicholas Campbell, sat inside the vehicle. [REDACTED] requested a deputy respond and investigate. At approximately 2350 hours, Deputy Marcus Mason was dispatched to the call.

At approximately 2356 hours, Mason arrived at the incident location and parked his marked patrol vehicle behind a gray Toyota Venza, bearing California License plate # [REDACTED]. Mason exited his vehicle and contacted the driver and sole occupant of the vehicle, Nicholas Campbell. Campbell claimed he was parked at the location as he waited for roadside assistance. Campbell claimed his extended wait at the location was because when he initially called for assistance, he provided the incorrect address. When asked for identification, Campbell stated he lost his identification card, but showed Mason a photograph of his identification card from his cellphone. Campbell provided his true name, date of birth, and showed Mason a photograph of his California Driver's License. During this interaction, Campbell was cooperative. Mason collected Campbell's identification information and returned to his patrol vehicle to conduct a records check.

A review of Mason's belt recorded audio revealed, Mason conducted a records check from his mobile data computer (MDC). Mason exited his patrol vehicle and re-approached Campbell's vehicle. Mason verbally confirmed with Campbell if he was on parole and asked if anything illegal was in his vehicle, to which Campbell replied, "No." Mason asked Campbell to exit his vehicle. Campbell was heard exiting his vehicle while he simultaneously asked, "Are you gonna pat me down?" A short struggle was heard, followed by the sound of four gunshots.

On Sunday, July 17, 2022, at approximately 0002 hours, Mason broadcasted over the sheriff's radio, he was shot and requested medical aid to expedite. While Mason was lying on the ground, a lethal force encounter (LFE) occurred as Campbell ran. Mason made several sheriff's radio transmissions which indicated he was shot and requested medical aid.

As numerous law enforcement officers from the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department (SBCSD) and surrounding law enforcement agencies responded, Mason provided Campbell's physical description and direction of travel. Mason broadcasted Campbell attempted to steal his marked patrol vehicle before he fled on foot. Several reporting parties called 9-1-1 and reported they heard gunshots in the area as Mason was on the ground.

Law Enforcement officers and deputies established a large perimeter in the nearby area. The SBCSD aviation (40K6) responded and located Campbell in the area and guided deputies to his location. When deputies arrived, Campbell was detained without incident and was found uninjured.

Deputy Melanie Aguayo took a photograph of Campbell and sent the photograph to Deputy Eric Rebollar, who was with Mason. Mason positively identified Campbell as the suspect who shot him. Campbell was searched and a Toyota key fob was located on his person. The Toyota key fob belonged to Campbell's Toyota Venza.

Detectives from the Specialized Investigations Division responded and assumed the investigation. Detective Malcolm Page and Crime Scene Specialist (CSI) [REDACTED] processed the crime scene. Based on scene evidence and Mason's belt recording, Mason fired 11-rounds from his handgun, in a [REDACTED] direction, toward Campbell. Campbell ran [REDACTED] on [REDACTED] then [REDACTED] on [REDACTED]

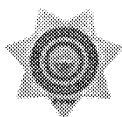
During the scene investigation, investigators located a Sig Sauer P320, .40 caliber handgun (no serial number) and three .40 caliber fired cartridge casings (FCC's) on the ground, near Campbell's vehicle. One additional .40 caliber FCC was located stuck inside the chamber of Campbell's handgun, which disabled the handgun. Nine additional live .40 caliber cartridges were contained in Campbell's handgun magazine. Investigators located Mason's Glock 17 handgun and 11 9MM FCCs on the ground, near Campbell's vehicle. [REDACTED] from the scene of the LFE, investigators located five suspected bullet strikes.

Investigators spoke with [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] resided at [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga, and his [REDACTED] slept over for the night. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] vehicles were parked on the [REDACTED] curb line edge, in front of [REDACTED] residence.

On Saturday, July 16, 2022, at approximately 2300 hours, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] returned from their dinner date and saw Campbell's vehicle parked in front of [REDACTED] residence. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] described [REDACTED] as a bald Black male adult.

Before they arrived home, [REDACTED] received a text message from his [REDACTED] who stated Campbell's vehicle was parked in front of the residence for several hours and was occupied. [REDACTED] called 9-1-1 and requested law enforcement contact Campbell.

[REDACTED] and [REDACTED] watched Campbell through an upstairs window until Mason arrived. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] witnessed Campbell exit his vehicle and assault Mason. Campbell pushed Mason onto the ground and stood over Mason. As Mason was on the ground, Campbell fired approximately four shots at Mason, before he fled on foot.

Mason was airlifted and flown by helicopter to the hospital and immediately taken into surgery. Mason sustained two gunshot wounds, one to the left side of his abdomen and one to his right flank (one round penetrated his ballistic vest). During a computed tomography (CT) scan two projectiles were seen near Mason's left pelvis. During surgery, one projectile was recovered from Mason and taken as evidence. Portions of Mason's large and small intestine were removed.

During a canvas of the area, investigators located video surveillance footage from a [REDACTED] which captured portions of Mason's assault. The video surveillance footage contained sound and captured Mason on the ground as he struggled with Campbell, after Mason was shot multiple times.

On Sunday, July 16, 2022, at approximately 0741 hours, Detectives Eric Ogaz and Jonathan Ramstad conducted an interview with Campbell in a private interview room at the Rancho Cucamonga Sheriff's Station. Prior to the interview, Campbell was advised of his Miranda Rights, and he agreed to provide a statement. According to Campbell, as he walked near [REDACTED] located at [REDACTED] he saw multiple law enforcement vehicles with their emergency lights activated. Campbell claimed he became fearful because he was on active parole. Campbell admitted he ran from deputies before he was detained. As the interview continued, Campbell requested an attorney, and the interview was concluded. Campbell was transported to West Valley Detention Center (WVDC) and later booked for PC 664/187(a), Attempted Murder.

BALLISTIC VEST INFORMATION:

On Saturday, July 16, 2022, investigators from the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department, Specialized Investigations Division, investigated a lethal force encounter (LFE) which occurred in Rancho Cucamonga.

During the investigation, it was determined Nicholas Campbell shot Deputy Marcus Mason. Initially, investigators believed a projectile Campbell fired penetrated the ballistic vest Mason wore during the LFE. Crime Scene Specialist (CSS) [REDACTED] conducted an analysis of Mason's ballistic vest and located the fired projectile within the vest. [REDACTED] determined the projectile did not penetrate Mason's ballistic vest.

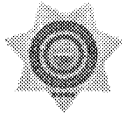
BRIEFING: (Continued)

On Sunday, July 17, 2022, [REDACTED] was an [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] and worked in the [REDACTED]. At an unknown time, an unidentified peace officer called the [REDACTED] and said a deputy was flown to [REDACTED] via helicopter, after he was shot. At an unknown time, [REDACTED] went to the [REDACTED] as the helicopter landed. [REDACTED] speculated the helicopter was [REDACTED] but was unsure.

[REDACTED] saw Mason taken off the helicopter to the [REDACTED]. At approximately 0027 hours, Mason entered the [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] saw Mason had two wounds, consistent with gunshot wounds, to the right lower side of his abdomen and his lower right flank. [REDACTED] could not determine if the injuries were gunshot entry or exit wounds. Mason wore only his red underwear. Mason's uniform and equipment were not transported with him on the gurney.

Mason was alert, awake and answered all questions. Mason's vital signs were stable, and the gunshot wound bleeding was controlled. [REDACTED] did not ask Mason what had occurred but spoke to him about his pain.

Mason complained of extreme back pain. While in the [REDACTED] at an unknown time, Mason was given 50 micrograms (mcg) of Fentanyl and 4 milligrams (mg) of Zofran for pain management. Mason said his right leg was numb. Mason did not want to move his leg due to the pain. [REDACTED] saw Mason was able to move his right leg despite the pain. [REDACTED] could not determine the severity of Mason's injuries.

Hospital staff performed a computed tomography (CT) scan on Mason. [REDACTED] observed the CT scan and saw two foreign bodies (fired bullets) on the scan. Lane believed the bullets traveled from Mason's right torso to the left side of his abdomen, possibly in Mason's gastrointestinal tract or near his left pelvis.

During the interview, [REDACTED] said one of the projectiles struck a portion of Mason's vertebrae. [REDACTED] believed a bullet strike to Mason's unspecified vertebrae explained his back pain. At approximately 0045 hours, Mason was taken to the [REDACTED] for [REDACTED]

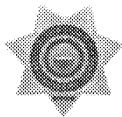

MEDICAL INTERVIEW: TRAUMA CRITICAL CARE SURGEON

On Sunday, July 17, 2022, at approximately 0416 hours, I interviewed [REDACTED] outside the [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] at [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] was a trauma critical care surgeon who performed Deputy Marcus Mason's surgical procedure. The interview was recorded with my department-issued audio recorder. The following is a summary of the interview.

On Sunday, July 17, 2022, at an unknown time, [REDACTED] contacted Mason in the [REDACTED] in preparation for a surgical procedure. [REDACTED] attempted to evaluate Mason. [REDACTED] asked Mason to move his arms and legs. Mason said he was unable to move due to his level of pain. Mason could move his feet, which showed lower extremity motor function. Mason did not complain of numbness to his extremities. [REDACTED] could not perform a complete examination on Mason due to his pain.

[REDACTED] did not recall Mason's clothing and speculated it was just his boxer shorts. Before surgery, hospital staff performed a computed tomography (CT) scan on Mason's abdomen to determine if the fired bullets were in Mason's abdomen. The CT scan showed two fired bullets in Mason's left abdomen.

At approximately 0100 hours, [REDACTED] performed a surgical procedure on Mason in an unspecified operating room at [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] said Mason sustained two gunshot wounds to his right anterior upper quadrant and right flank. [REDACTED] discovered Mason had gunshot injuries to both his large and small intestines during the surgery. One of the fired bullets fractured Mason's lumbar vertebrae. [REDACTED] was unable to determine the trajectory of the fired bullets.

[REDACTED] recovered one of the two fired bullets from a muscle within the left side of Mason's abdomen. [REDACTED] did not locate the other fired bullet. [REDACTED] could not specify which fired bullet caused the specific injuries. After the fired bullet was recovered, it was placed in a specimen container.

When [REDACTED] concluded the surgical procedure, Mason was in stable condition. At the time of the interview, [REDACTED] could not determine Mason's long-term prognosis or potential complications.

14 arch up my to like lean forward I couldn't twist, I couldn't do
15 anything and I knew—
16
17 OGAZ Oh, shoot.
18
19 OGAZ: Sorry about the Marcus. Go ahead.
20
21 MASON: So, I knew immediately I knew if he got my gun, I was dead. I
22 knew he was gonna kill me. I knew he'd be able to shoot me
23 anywhere he wanted to. I would have no other way to defend
24 myself. There was no other equipment I had to overcome him
25 taking my weapon. And so, I held on I held on as tight as I could
26 with my right hand, and I held on to the other gun as tight as I
27 can with my left and I continue to just hold on and hold tight. I
28

1 couldn't rotate I couldn't try to rotate onto that side to keep him
2 from getting it. It was just a matter of who's gonna be stronger.
3
4 And that's it I just held on as tight as I can, eventually he gave
5 up. And he ran back to my unit. And so, he started running
6 towards my unit and he to the driver side he grabbed my-my
7 door handle and he started pulling on the door handle as hard as
8 he could to try to open the car door to steal my unit, but I had
9 locked the doors before I reapproached the vehicle. I was like, I
10 need to get my gun out. I don't know, if I don't get my gun out
11 right now and he comes back. If he has another weapon like, I'm
12 dead. I don't have any way to protect myself, I can't get up. I
13 can't roll I can't get to cover. I already tried to get to the radio it
14 wasn't working. And it's I didn't, I didn't feel comfortable dropping
15 any of the weapon systems with him only however many feet
16 away I was from my unit. And so, I was trying as hard as I could
17 to get my gun out. And he gave up on trying to get in my unit, he
18 started running back towards his car.
19
20 And so, I looked down to pop the hood of my holster and get my
21 gun out. And he was back towards his car. By the time I was
22 able to get my gun out and I looked back up, he popped back out
23 from around the car. And I started firing rounds. And he ran, he
24 ran up the street. Once he was pretty much out of sight, I
25 stopped shooting. I hit my emergency button on my radio. And I
26 just the whole time like I didn't know how much time I had left.
27 But I knew I needed to while I was still alive, I needed to get as
28

1 much radio traffic out as I could to help my partners. I didn't
2 know I didn't want this guy to attack my partners. They don't
3 know what he looks like. They don't know what he's capable.
4 They don't know that I'm shot right now. I don't have anybody in
5 route. I don't have any backup. To my knowledge there was no
6 radio traffic that went out to ask me if I was okay. So I knew I
7 knew like I had a limited amount of time and I need to get out as
8 much information as possible.

9
10 I was thinking about my [REDACTED] I was I didn't want to leave; I didn't
11 want to be leave them alone. I don't have much family down
12 here. I just thought man, I have to live. And I just didn't know how
13 much time I needed. I mean I had it. So immediately once I hit
14 my emergency button on my radio. It felt like dispatch just
15 stopped all radio traffic and I was able to start putting out radio
16 traffic. And I let her know that I had been shot. I let everybody
17 know I've been shot. I couldn't feel my legs, I needed medical
18 expedited as fast as possible. I knew I needed medical attention
19 fast. And that's all I could think about it. Then I was like alright, I
20 start to give a description of the suspect which direction he ran.
21 Because then I just tried to give out as much detail as possible
22 with that I remembered about the suspect.

23
24 And so, I just I laid there and holding my gun. I didn't know if he
25 was gonna come back. I didn't know after I lost sight of him I
26 didn't know I figured people were going to be coming up if I didn't
27 give a description or even if he saw the sirens if he came back
28

1 and tried to, you know, kill me and try to figure out how to get my
2 car keys and take off I didn't know so I just sat there holding my
3 gun and just waiting for somebody to show up waiting for
4 medical waiting for anything. And I was just counting the time. I
5 hadn't talked to my [REDACTED] to tell her goodnight or anything like that.
6 And I was just waiting, just waiting.

7
8 Finally, Deputy Rebollar, I remember he was first on scene and
9 DJ, they asked me where I was shot and I said I didn't know. I
10 did not they had me put my gun down, put my gun down. I had a
11 really-really rough, strong pain in my stomach and my abdomen
12 area. So, I reached down, and I touched my abdomen and I
13 looked at my hand and it was just covered in blood. And I was
14 like my stomach. I know I'm shot in my stomach and my legs
15 don't work. From there they took my uniform off and my vest and
16 my belt and then they pulled everything else off they needed to
17 apply care to my wounds.

18
19 And I remember my watch and ringing and all I could think about
20 is calling my [REDACTED] I didn't know if it was gonna be the last time, I
21 spoke to her. I didn't know what I was gonna say to her. I felt like
22 I let her down. Because she, she never really wanted me to get
23 into law enforcement. So, I felt like I was always gonna come
24 home. And I felt like, during the whole incident, I didn't know if I
25 was coming home to them. And I, I just I was trying to, like think
26 like, what is she gonna do without me? They're everything to me
27 and I'm everything to them. And I just, I didn't, I just didn't know
28

1 how everything's gonna be with me not being there.

2
3 And I just looked up at the sky as they worked on me. I wasn't
4 worried about anything else. I was just like, I gotta live, I gotta
5 live. It was not it wasn't an option for me. During the incident, I
6 just was, I was fighting for my life. From the moment he reached
7 for that gun, I knew what I was going to be fighting for my life, I
8 knew I was going to be you know, either going to it was live or
9 die. And I had to do everything in my power to try I tried
10 everything in my power to keep him from shooting me. But once I
11 was shot, it was you know. I just had to live.

12
13 So, once they finished applying dressings to my wounds. Deputy
14 Rebollar went back to his unit, and he drove it down and pulled it
15 back up. And they want to carry me into the unit. And they went
16 to pick me up from behind my arms. And I'm like kind of have me
17 walk to the unit, I'm like my legs don't work do I can't I don't have
18 any function in my legs. And so, I don't know (inaudible) my legs,
19 but they put me in the back seat of the unit and during it,
20 somebody was trying to radio for a helicopter. So, we drove, and
21 [REDACTED] met us I'm not exactly sure where, but they were
22 basically waiting for us. And they put me in the back of the, they
23 put me inside the helicopter from-from the backseat of the car to
24 the helicopter. And we then we flew, and I ended up at [REDACTED]
25 and from there that was it pretty much. It was just wondering if I
26 was gonna live or die at that moment. So.

Not that I remember. That was the main details. They didn't give like a race or anything. I don't I don't believe at the time. I'm sure I'm sure they gave the color of the vehicle. I don't remember exactly. I'm not sure if they gave a make, if they gave a (inaudible) call a plate that way she can lock into the call. But I'm sure they gave a description of the vehicle. Bald male sitting in a vehicle with the flashers on. That was pretty much the main part of what I remember from the MDC.

So, we just got to think he said you turned onto [REDACTED] you were going [REDACTED] bound [REDACTED]

Um-hum.

And what did you see that made you believe that that was the vehicle for the Dispatch call the vehicle check?

He had his flashers on, and I see the male, he had lights on inside his vehicle so his vehicle was well lit and I could see that it was a bald male. He was also the only person sitting in a vehicle on that street. There weren't many vehicles on that street so. So it fit the description.

And you said that lights are on inside of his vehicle, correct? And the flashers were on, on the outside of the vehicle. So, was it a

No, I was focusing on getting to the car. The main thing I was listening for to see if it was if there's any abnormalities with the car like if it was stolen, or the car was wanted for any reason. I didn't hear that, so I was pretty much too stressed out and I as focused directly on him and getting to the car.

OGAZ:

Now you mentioned when you first, this is during the first contact. After you parked behind Mr. Campbell's vehicle, you exit your patrol vehicle, and you lock it is that normal for you to do?

MASON:

That was... I locked it after when I was approaching the car for the second time. Usually on like traffic stops I don't. On certain things when I know I might be away from my vehicle for awhile or if I know like in this situation, I knew I was gonna, it may have been a little bit before I got back, and he was on parole for a

7 conversation with him. Basically, the reasons why you're here.

11 said that you ran his information on your MDC.

25 radio, your unit radio or did you use your mic on your chest?

23 waiting for all the traffic. So, I didn't send that (inaudible), I

SUSPECT INTERVIEW: (Nicholas Campbell)

On Sunday, July 17, 2022, at approximately 0741 hours, Detective Jonathan Ramstad and I interviewed Nicholas Campbell at the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department, Rancho Cucamonga Station, located at 10510 Civic Center Drive, in Rancho Cucamonga. I recorded the interview with my department-issued digital recorder, and I later placed a copy of the recording into the case file. The following is a summary of our interview with Campbell.

Before I spoke to Campbell, Detective Pat Leon informed me Campbell stated he wanted to kill himself. I asked Campbell if he wanted to harm himself. Campbell explained he was off of his medication and heard voices. Campbell would not tell me what the voices said. Campbell was diagnosed as Schizophrenic in 2005 and had Attention-Deficit Disorder (ADD) since the second grade. Campbell was supposed to take psychological medication daily. Campbell had not taken his prescribed medication for approximately one month.

I read Campbell his Miranda Rights per my department-issued Miranda card. When asked if he understood his rights, Campbell stated, "I don't know what you want to talk about. You read me my rights, but I don't know what you want to talk about." Campbell explained he was walking across the street when he saw law enforcement vehicles everywhere. Campbell ran when he saw law enforcement because he was on parole. I asked Campbell where he resided. Campbell replied he lived in [REDACTED]. I asked Campbell how he arrived in Rancho Cucamonga. Campbell stated he did not want to answer any more questions and he wanted to speak with an attorney.

I did not ask Campbell any additional questions. We concluded our interview with Campbell.

RESULTS AND CONCLUSIONS

Particles considered characteristic of gunshot residue are particles that contain the elements lead, barium, and antimony.

Item I – SEM GSR kit from Nicholas Campbell

No characteristic gunshot residue particles were identified on the right or left hand adhesive discs.

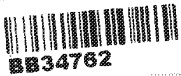
The absence of characteristic gunshot residue particles on the hands is consistent with an individual not: having fired a firearm, being in the proximity of a discharging firearm, or contacting a surface that has GSR on it, including handling a firearm or ammunition.

However, the absence of characteristic gunshot residue particles does not eliminate an individual from having fired or handled a firearm or being in the proximity of a discharging firearm. A negative result could occur from circumstances such as washing or wiping of the hands, wearing gloves, sweating, environmental factors including wind and rain, blood or excessive debris on the hands, or normal physical activity passing between a firearm event and sampling.

The results apply to the item tested as received by the agency.

On Sunday, July 17, 2022, I was assigned as the On-Call Detective for the Rancho Cucamonga Police Department. At 0043 hours I received a phone call from Sergeant Scalise informing me a Rancho Cucamonga deputy had been shot and I needed to respond to the station to assist with the investigation.

Details:

On Saturday, July 16, 2022, at approximately 2350 hours, deputies from the Rancho Cucamonga Police Department were dispatched to the area of [REDACTED] Rancho Cucamonga, in regard to a vehicle check. The reporting party said the vehicle had been parked in front of the incident location for two hours. The vehicle was occupied by one Black male adult, sitting in the driver's seat and felt this was suspicious. Deputy Mason arrived on scene and subsequently ran a records check on the vehicle license plate (# [REDACTED]) and on a male subject identified as Nicholas Dane Campbell, [REDACTED]. During the contact, Campbell shot deputy Mason multiple times with a handgun and fled the scene. Mason radio broadcasted shots had been fired and he had been hit.

Mason gave Campbell's description as a Black male adult, bald head, wearing dark clothing, running [REDACTED] from the incident location. Additional deputies responded to the scene to look for the suspect and set up a perimeter. Deputies were searching near the area of [REDACTED] located at [REDACTED] Rancho Cucamonga. Deputies located a subject matching the description and a foot pursuit ensued. The subject (identified as Nicholas Campbell) subsequently laid on the ground and proned himself out in front of the residence of [REDACTED] Rancho Cucamonga. There was a "Golden State Advantage" EBT card with the name "Nicholas Campbell" on the ground next to where the subject proned himself out.

Rancho Cucamonga Police Department K9 "Keyva" and her deputy handler started tracking the suspect from the original incident location and ended up alerting at the patrol unit where Campbell was detained at, in front of [REDACTED].

The deputy who was shot, looked at a driver's license photograph of Nicholas Campbell and confirmed that was the subject who shot him. Other deputies that were on scene confirmed the driver's license photograph was the same person they had detained.

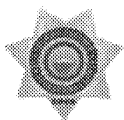
Search Warrant:

Based on the facts and information listed above, I had probable cause to believe DNA Buccal swabs, blood samples, gunshot residue and the clothing from Nicholas Campbell were lawfully seizable pursuant to Penal Code Section 1524 and would tend to show Campbell committed a felony.

The Honorable San Bernardino County Superior Court Judge Joni Sinclair reviewed and approved the search warrant (Warrant ID #000091091) on Sunday, July 17, 2022 at 0419 hours, including Hobbs Sealing and Night Service.

NARRATIVE**ASSIGNMENT/ARRIVAL:**

On 07/17/22, I was assigned to work uniformed patrol in the city of Rancho Cucamonga as the canine patrol unit. My call sign was 11K94. At approximately 0001 hours, I responded to the area of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] regarding a deputy who needed assistance. Deputy M. Mason advised shots were fired and he was injured.

DEPUTY OBSERVATIONS/ACTIONS:

Upon my arrival, Deputy Mason was laying on his back in the middle of [REDACTED] just [REDACTED] of [REDACTED]. There was a grey SUV bearing license plate number [REDACTED] parked along the curb on the [REDACTED] curb of [REDACTED]. Deputy Mason's patrol vehicle was parked directly behind the suspect's vehicle.

Deputy Johnson and Deputy Rebollar were also on scene and assisted with rendering aid to Mason. As we removed layers of clothing and body armor from Mason, I noticed what appeared to be a gunshot wound to the lower right side of Mason's abdomen. There was also another wound to the lower right side of Mason's back. At first sight, the wound appeared to be one single gunshot wound which entered one side and exited the other. I applied pressure to the wound using my hand and Mason's shirt as deputy Rebollar retrieved a trauma pack from his vehicle. Using a sterile dressing, I continued to apply pressure as Rebollar wrapped the wound.

Mason was conscience and coherent and was able to tell me the suspect shot him and pointed to the suspect's gun. A black handgun was laying on the ground in the middle of the street, just [REDACTED] of Mason. Mason was also able to confirm the grey SUV belonged to the suspect.

Deputy Johnson, Rebollar and I loaded Mason into the back of Rebollar's patrol vehicle and Rebollar transported him to [REDACTED] where he was airlifted to a hospital.

Due to the suspect fleeing on foot, I contacted Deputy Jasso to assist with a canine search for the suspect. I used a sterile gauze pad to collect scent from the driver seat of the suspect's vehicle and waited for Jasso to arrive. As I waited, I noticed a spent ammo casing near the driver door of the suspect vehicle. At the time, this was the only casing I noticed near the vehicle. In order to identify and preserve the location of the casing, I placed an orange traffic cone over it.

As Jasso arrived, deputies located and were attempting to detain the suspect. As they were detaining the suspect, Deputy Jasso and I used canine Keva for a search. At the conclusion of the canine search, I retraced the path of the canine and attempted to locate any items that may have been discarded by the suspect. There were no items located along the path.

RECORDINGS:

My response to the incident location was audio recorded. The recording was uploaded to the Fault System.

NARRATIVE**ASSIGNMENT / ARRIVAL:**

On Saturday, June 16, 2022, I was assigned DUI traffic enforcement in the city of Rancho Cucamonga. At 2351 hours, I was assisting Deputy Eric Rebollar on a hit and run collision investigation in the vicinity of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. Deputy Casey Allen was also on the scene of the collision.

On Sunday, June 17, at 0002 hours, a deputy aired a radio transmission of "Shots fired!" and "Expedite meds!" I located the call on my MDC and the location was in the area of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. We immediately left the scene of the collision and drove to the incident location. We arrived at approximately 0004 hours.

OBSERVATION / ACTIONS:

When I arrived on the scene, I observed Deputy Marcus Mason lying on the roadway near the [REDACTED] curb line of [REDACTED]. An unoccupied Toyota Venza was positioned along the [REDACTED] curb line of [REDACTED] with a marked Sheriff's patrol unit positioned behind it. I exited my vehicle and immediately scanned the area for anyone on the scene. Rebollar, Allen, and I ran over to assist Mason.

I approached Mason, from his head which was facing [REDACTED]. Allen positioned herself [REDACTED] of his body near his right shoulder and Rebollar positioned himself [REDACTED] of his body at his feet. Mason said he was shot in the stomach. We immediately began removing his uniform and gear to locate any injuries. Once his uniform and vest were removed, we located what appeared to be a gunshot wound to his lower right abdomen. Mason was moaning and appeared to be in a great deal of pain and agony. He was rocking side to side as we continued searching for additional injuries. Allen told Rebollar to get the first aid kit from the patrol unit. Rebollar ran to the unit while Allen and I reminded each other that the suspect could still be near and to remain vigilant. We continued to look around as we rendered first aid to Mason. I noticed a male subject approaching us from the [REDACTED] sidewalk. The male was putting on a dark-colored shirt. I yelled for the subject to stay where he was because I did not know if he was related to the incident. The subject said he wanted to see if he could help.

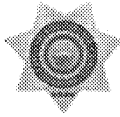
Rebollar returned with the medical kit and dropped down by Mason's feet. Rebollar unrolled an Israeli Emergency Bandage as Allen, and I rolled Mason onto his left side and located what we believed to be the exit wound from the gunshot. Allen applied pressure to the wound with her hands as Rebollar and I began to put on the bandage. We wrapped Mason's wounds with the bandage by lifting his waist and rolling the bandage around his abdomen. Once Mason's wounds were wrapped, I looked around and noticed two black handguns on the ground just north of our position with several bullet shell casings nearby. One of the guns located appeared to have ridges on the barrel and SIG on the magazine plate.

Mason told us he could not feel his right leg. Rebollar ran to get his patrol unit so we could transport Mason. Allen continued looking for injuries as I repositioned myself towards his legs to scan them for additional injuries. I did not find any additional injuries to Mason's legs. I repositioned myself back towards the right side of his chest and head. Rebollar returned with his patrol unit and had removed multiple items from the front seat. Rebollar told Mason to stand up but Mason said, "I can't feel my leg." We told the airship to land in the parking lot of [REDACTED] for medical evacuation. I positioned myself at Mason's head as Rebollar positioned himself at Mason's feet. I picked Mason up as I wrapped my arms around his chest and underneath his arms. Rebollar and I lifted Mason simultaneously and carried him to the rear of the patrol unit. Rebollar inserted Deputy Mason's feet into the vehicle from the passenger side as I held on to Mason, sliding him further into the back seat. Another medical personnel subject arrived and helped Rebollar put Mason into the back seat.

I climbed into the back seat and rested Mason's head and upper torso on my lap. The medical personnel subject also entered the back of the unit placing Mason's legs across him as he closed the door. Rebollar got into the driver's seat and started to drive off. While driving away, he immediately ran over an unknown object. We heard the unknown object dragging and causing the vehicle to stall. Allen was outside of the vehicle telling Rebollar to stop as she and an

additional medical personnel pulled the item out from underneath the unit. Once the item was removed, Rebollar drove towards [REDACTED]. We heard radio traffic which said the suspect was somewhere near the vicinity of [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] looked to the [REDACTED] and observed the airship landing in the [REDACTED] parking lot of the campus.

Rebollar drove into the parking lot and the airship landed. Rebollar exited the vehicle and an unknown deputy opened the passenger side door for me to exit. I wrapped my arms around Mason's chest and under his arms and stepped out backwards from the vehicle. I held onto Mason until Rebollar came around and grabbed his feet. We carried Mason to the airship and were directed by a pilot waving his hands signaling us to bring him around to the [REDACTED] entrance of the airship. The pilot signaled us to wait as he entered the airship and removed a seat and threw it onto the parking lot.

As room was made in the airship, we were signaled to place Mason into the airship. Rebollar slid Mason's feet onto the airship floor as I held him and guided his body in. The pilot pulled Mason into the airship as we lifted his chest and headed onto the floor. The medical personnel got onto the airship and flew with Mason to the hospital. We both stayed vigilant and ready since the radio traffic stated the suspect was possibly on campus. Once the airship took off, we returned to the patrol unit and recovered the seat thrown from the airship and placed it in the back of the patrol unit.

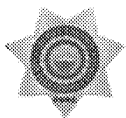
AREA CHECK:

We conducted an area check within the campus grounds to search for the suspect. As we drove around using our spotlights and flashlights scanning, we heard radio traffic that the suspect was being detained on the [REDACTED] side of the [REDACTED]. The suspect was in custody, but units needed identification of the suspect. Since all units were currently unavailable, we headed towards [REDACTED] to have Mason identify the suspect through a picture obtained from units who detained the subject.

We arrived at [REDACTED] and entered the emergency room. We were informed Mason was getting a CT scan and we would be notified once he was able to speak with us. When Mason was done with the CT scan, he was rolled into the hallway in a hospital bed. Sergeant Mike Mason, Rebollar and I were present as we showed Mason the picture of the suspect who deputies detained. Rebollar showed Mason the picture of the detained suspect and Mason positively identified the suspect Nicholas Campbell D.O.B [REDACTED] as the one who shot him. After showing him the picture, we asked how he was doing. Mason responded by asking us if he was going to die. We made light of the question by responding in a joking manner to ease his mind, but I instantly felt overwhelmed by a sense of sadness and uncertainty. I announced over the radio that Mason gave a positive identification of the suspect detained. We all felt the pain and empathized with our injured partner.

We drove [REDACTED] on [REDACTED] [REDACTED] on [REDACTED], and [REDACTED] on [REDACTED]. I heard the dispatcher tell the responding units that the suspect was still outstanding. Mason then provided a description of the suspect. He described him as a black male with a bald head and wore a t shirt and shorts. As I approached the intersection with [REDACTED] I observed a white male flagging us down and pointing [REDACTED].

I turned [REDACTED] on [REDACTED] and saw Deputy Mason laying in the middle of the street. He laid perpendicular with his feet towards the [REDACTED] curb and his head towards the [REDACTED] curb. I parked my patrol vehicle a few feet away from him and ran over to him. Johnson and Allen also exited their vehicles and ran over to Mason. Mason told me the suspect fled the area. I told him not to worry about the suspect and reassured him that we would take care of him. Mason moaned in pain as he told me he was shot in the stomach. I knelt near his feet, as Johnson positioned himself near his head. Allen positioned herself along Mason's right side. We removed Mason's duty belt and clothes. Mason had a gunshot wound on the front side of his abdomen and another wound on the back side of his abdomen. The wound on his front abdomen was not actively bleeding. The wound on his back abdomen did bleed as we treated him. I ran to my patrol car, retrieved the active shooter trauma kit, and returned to Mason. Allen, Johnson and I applied a gauze on both wounds and wrapped an Israeli bandage around Mason's waist to keep them in place.

As we treated Mason, I told the dispatcher that it appeared Mason had a through and through gunshot wound. I requested a helicopter land at the [REDACTED] campus to transport Mason to a hospital. I felt powerless as I saw Mason again moan in agonizing pain. Allen asked Mason if the suspect shot him. Mason told us the suspect did shoot him and he was able to get the gun from the suspect. I looked around and saw a black handgun in the street a few feet away from me. I recognized the base plate on the magazine of the handgun read Sig Sauer. Allen advised dispatch that there were two firearms at the scene.

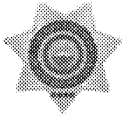
I repositioned my vehicle to load Mason in the back seat. I ran over to Mason and gave him my hand to get him up off the ground. Mason yelled in pain, "I can't walk bro." Allen, Johnson, and I picked up Mason and began loading him into my patrol vehicle. Fire fighters from Rancho Cucamonga Fire Department arrived at the scene. We explained to them that a helicopter was enroute to pick up Mason. One firefighter helped secure Mason into the backseat. Deputy Johnson and this firefighter got in the back seat of my vehicle with Mason, and I started to drive to the Chaffee College Campus. I drove [REDACTED] a few feet, but my vehicle stalled as I heard a loud dragging sound. I put my vehicle in reverse and another firefighter removed a large heart rate monitor from our path.

I drove [REDACTED] on [REDACTED] on [REDACTED] then [REDACTED] on [REDACTED]. I heard radio transmissions advising that the suspect was last seen running [REDACTED] on [REDACTED] by [REDACTED]. As I made the right turn onto [REDACTED] I saw a helicopter preparing to land in an empty parking lot on the [REDACTED] side of [REDACTED] of [REDACTED]. It was at this moment that I realized we were about to drive into the same area where the suspect was last seen, but we did not have time to change the helicopter's landing zone. Mason's need for medical aid outweighed our safety concerns and we continued with the plan. I made a U-turn at one of the openings in the center

median and parked in the parking lot where the helicopter was landing. Deputy K. Smit drove into the parking lot and asked if we needed help. Deputy Smit, [REDACTED] the firefighter, and I removed Mason from my patrol vehicle and carried him to the helicopter. A crewman opened the helicopter door and we loaded Mason in. The crewmember removed a seat from the helicopter and made room for the firefighter to also go with Mason. The helicopter went airborne and transported Mason to the [REDACTED]. I advised dispatch and responding units that Mason was now in transport to the hospital.

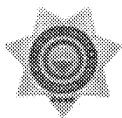
SUSPECT IDENTIFICATION:

Deputy Johnson and I got back into my patrol vehicle and searched for the suspect through the parking lots of the [REDACTED]. After approximately five minutes we heard radio transmissions advising that the suspect was found and detained in the area of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. Deputies now needed to confirm the subject detained was in fact the suspect that shot Mason. Deputy M. Aguayo took a digital photograph of the subject that was detained and sent it to me.

Deputy Johnson and I drove to the [REDACTED] to speak with Mason. We arrived at the [REDACTED] as Mason received a CT scan. A nurse told us we would only be able to speak to him briefly because he needed surgery. We waited for approximately 10 minutes then saw Mason as he was rolled into the hallway in a hospital bed. Sergeant M. Mason, and Johnson were with me as I showed Mason the picture of the suspect who was detained by deputies. Mason positively identified the suspect as the person who shot him. Johnson used the radio to tell the deputies at the scene that Mason gave a positive identification of the suspect detained.

NARRATIVE**ASSIGNMENT/ARRIVAL:**

On Sunday July 17, 2022, I was assigned to the City of Rancho Cucamonga as the canine patrol unit. My call sign was 11K95. Rancho Cucamonga Sheriff's Station requested the tracking canine to help locate a suspect who had just shot a deputy and fled on foot.

CANINE INFORMATION:

Canine "KEVA" is a ten-month-old pure breed trailing bloodhound, who is certified and has been found reliable through the Scent Evidence K9. I have attended a 240 hour in house and on the job training. I have also attended a 40-hour Basic Canine Handlers course through Goldstone K-9 LLC and an 80-hour Basic Canine Handlers course through Scent Evidence K9.

SCENT ARTICLE:

Deputy Allen collected a scent article from the vehicle. Allen used a sterile 4x4 gauze pad to collect scent from the driver seat of the vehicle. The gauze pad was placed on the driver's seat to collect scent through direct absorption.

The gauze pad was later placed in a sterile glass container and used as the scent article given to Keva to trail the suspect.

K9 DEPLOYMENT:

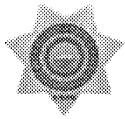

At approximately 0001 hours on Sunday July 17, 2022, I heard Deputy Mason say over the radio he had been shot and he could not feel his leg. I was in the area of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] and began driving [REDACTED] toward [REDACTED]. I saw on my patrol unit's MDC that Mason was near the intersection of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. I responded to the scene with lights and sirens activated.

PERIMETER SET-UP:

At approximately 0006 hours, I arrived at the intersection of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. I positioned my patrol unit near the southeast corner. Multiple additional sheriff's department deputies and outside agencies (Fontana Police Department, Ontario Police Department, and California Highway Patrol) began arriving on scene. Units set up a perimeter around [REDACTED].

A reporting party reported seeing a subject run through the bushes [REDACTED] through [REDACTED]. I held the perimeter, along with additional units, until the suspect was detained. I then responded to the intersection of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] where I contacted Sergeant De La Torre and offered my assistance.

██████ had a Ring surveillance camera that faced toward ██████ residence. ██████ reviewed the surveillance footage and saw Campbell arrive on ██████ at approximately 2040 hours. Campbell's vehicle traveled ██████ on ██████ and turned into ██████ driveway. Campbell's vehicle drove the length of ██████ driveway before he reversed and turned ██████ on ██████ where he parked.

██████ returned home and called ██████. According to ██████ did not recognize Campbell or his vehicle. ██████ asked ██████ if he should notify law enforcement. ██████ advised ██████ to request law enforcement do a courtesy drive-by.

Moments later Ruben received a call from San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department Dispatch. According to Ruben, Cardenas asked dispatch to call Ruben for additional information on Campbell. Dispatch asked Ruben for a description of Campbell's vehicle. Ruben explained it was dark outside and he could only describe the vehicle as a dark sports utility vehicle (SUV).

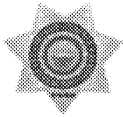

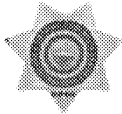

As [REDACTED] turned [REDACTED] on [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga, he saw a dark gray sedan parked on the [REDACTED] side of [REDACTED]. The vehicle was parked with its emergency hazard lights on. [REDACTED] saw a subject, later identified as Nicholas Campbell, sitting in the driver seat of the sedan. Campbell appeared to be looking down at a tablet or cell phone. Campbell briefly looked up and made eye contact with [REDACTED]

At approximately 2335 hours, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] took their dogs into the front yard to look at Campbell's vehicle. Campbell sat in the front seat and nothing appeared to have changed. According to [REDACTED] [REDACTED] contacted his [REDACTED] over the phone and asked about the vehicle parked in front of [REDACTED] residence. According to [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were not familiar with the subject parked in the roadway and were concerned for the safety of the neighborhood. [REDACTED] believed [REDACTED] called law enforcement to have a deputy respond and check on Campbell and his vehicle. [REDACTED] believed an unknown neighbor, possibly [REDACTED] provided his phone number to the law enforcement dispatcher.

Between 2345 to 2350 hours, [REDACTED] received a phone call from a dispatcher at San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department. The dispatcher asked [REDACTED] to describe Campbell and his vehicle parked in the roadway. [REDACTED] wanted to provide the dispatcher with an accurate description so [REDACTED] went outside to his own vehicle. [REDACTED] vehicle was a white GMC Yukon. The Yukon was parked on [REDACTED] in front of the [REDACTED] residence. When [REDACTED] went outside, he saw Campbell walking around in the roadway on a cell phone. Campbell approached [REDACTED] and began to speak with him. Campbell stopped in the roadway approximately 50 to 75 feet [REDACTED] of [REDACTED]. Campbell told [REDACTED] he did not want to startle him. Campbell explained to [REDACTED] he had car trouble and was waiting for AAA. [REDACTED] offered to help Campbell with his vehicle, but Campbell declined his offer. [REDACTED] believed Campbell's story and did not find it suspicious.

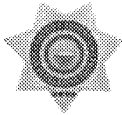

██████ described Campbell as a Black male adult, approximately 6' to 6' 1", bald, and had a goatee. Campbell wore a white button-up shirt, black or navy blue cargo shorts, and sandals with straps. ██████ went back into the residence to provide the dispatcher with an accurate description of Campbell and his vehicle. The dispatcher hung up the phone when ██████ returned to the house. ██████ heard two rapid gunshots, an approximate half-second pause, followed by a third gunshot. There was a short pause, followed by approximately 12 to 15 rapid gunshots.

After the gunshots, ██████ advised ██████ and ██████ to go upstairs and turn off all the lights in the residence. ██████ and ██████ went upstairs and hid in a corner of a bedroom to avoid being struck by stray bullets. Approximately three to five minutes after the gunshots, ██████ heard the sirens of responding patrol vehicles. The ██████ residence was in the process of being painted and most of the windows were covered by plastic. ██████ could not see out any windows of the house. ██████ went to an upstairs bathroom where the window was not covered by plastic. ██████ opened the small bathroom window and looked outside. ██████ saw the reflection of red and blue lights but was unable to see anything further.

At approximately 0018 hours, ██████ believed the incident was over so he went outside the residence. ██████ saw a ballistic vest laying in the middle of the roadway. ██████ never saw the deputy involved in the incident. ██████ did not see Campbell after he spoke with him earlier in the evening. ██████ was unsure if he would be able to identify Campbell in a photographic lineup. ██████ was concerned because he did not get close to Campbell. Additionally, ██████ was not comfortable identifying Campbell in a photographic lineup because he was worried someone would come after him.

██████ advised me the ██████ had multiple Ring security cameras around the house. ██████ briefly reviewed some of the cameras and believed they recorded some of the incident. ██████ advised we could get a copy of the recordings from ██████ or ██████

██████ did not have any additional information to provide, and we concluded our interview with him.

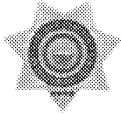

On Saturday, July 16, 2022, at approximately 2330 hours, [REDACTED] drove home from camping at the beach. [REDACTED] turned [REDACTED] on [REDACTED] and saw a gray sedan parked on the [REDACTED] side of the roadway. [REDACTED] noticed the vehicle had its emergency hazard lights on. A Black male adult, later identified as Nicholas Campbell, sat in the front driver seat of the gray sedan, with the seat slightly reclined. Campbell had short hair, a beard, and wore a white t-shirt. [REDACTED] briefly made eye contact with Campbell as Campbell sat in the driver's seat of the gray sedan.

When [REDACTED] arrived at his residence, he had items he wanted to unload from his vehicle, but was uncomfortable due to Campbell being in the roadway. [REDACTED] left the items in the vehicle and went inside his residence. Once inside, [REDACTED] asked [REDACTED] to open all the windows in the house. [REDACTED] opened the windows and went to his upstairs bedroom.

At approximately 2340 hours, [REDACTED] heard approximately six to eight gunshots. [REDACTED] heard a subject, later identified as Deputy Marcus Mason, yell "shots fired." At approximately 2341 hours, [REDACTED] looked out a second-story window of his residence and observed a Sheriff's patrol vehicle behind the gray sedan. [REDACTED] did not see overhead lights activated or any spotlights activated on the patrol vehicle.

At approximately 2343 hours, [REDACTED] saw three to four additional patrol vehicles arrive at the intersection of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] could not clearly see Mason lay on the ground because a bush blocked his view. Responding deputies provided medical aid to Mason. [REDACTED] believed deputies were performing cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) on Mason, but [REDACTED] view was obstructed so he was unsure what care was provided. [REDACTED] did not see Mason before the shooting and did not get a clear look at him after the shooting. [REDACTED] has never seen Campbell besides the initial brief eye contact when [REDACTED] arrived at his residence.

[REDACTED] did not have any additional information to provide, and we ended the interview with him.

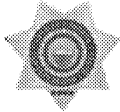

[REDACTED] had three surveillance cameras on the front of his residence located at [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga. One surveillance camera was in a window above his garage and faced [REDACTED] toward [REDACTED]. One surveillance camera was above his driveway on the [REDACTED] side of the house and faced [REDACTED] toward [REDACTED]. There was a Ring doorbell on Martin's front door. The Ring camera faced [REDACTED] toward [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] allowed me to check the surveillance system and Ring application to see if the Lethal Force Encounter (LFE) was recorded. The cameras were motion activated and did not activate during the LFE.

On Saturday, July 16, 2022, [REDACTED] planned to pick up a friend from the airport. At approximately 2340 hours, [REDACTED] got in his vehicle and prepared to leave for the airport. [REDACTED] opened the garage door and backed his white sports utility vehicle (SUV) into his driveway. [REDACTED] saw a Toyota SUV parked on [REDACTED] in front of his residence. [REDACTED] thought it was odd the Toyota SUV was parked in front of his residence and that the emergency hazard light were on. [REDACTED] did not hear the Toyota SUV running and did not see anyone inside.

[REDACTED] realized he forgot his handicap placard inside his house. [REDACTED] exited his vehicle and saw a marked Sheriff's patrol vehicle pull behind the Toyota SUV. [REDACTED] saw a deputy, later identified as Deputy Marcus Mason, approach the Toyota SUV. [REDACTED] said Mason wore a Sheriff's uniform but could not describe him. [REDACTED] did not pay attention to Mason and entered his residence.

On Saturday, July 16, At approximately 2345 hours, [REDACTED] heard approximately eight loud popping noises from outside his residence. [REDACTED] believed the popping noises were gunshots. [REDACTED] heard several continuous gunshots, with a short pause, and then two additional gunshots. [REDACTED] waited in his kitchen for several minutes to ensure it was safe for him to exit his residence. [REDACTED] intended to dial 9-1-1 but left his cell phone in his vehicle.

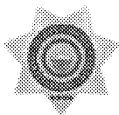

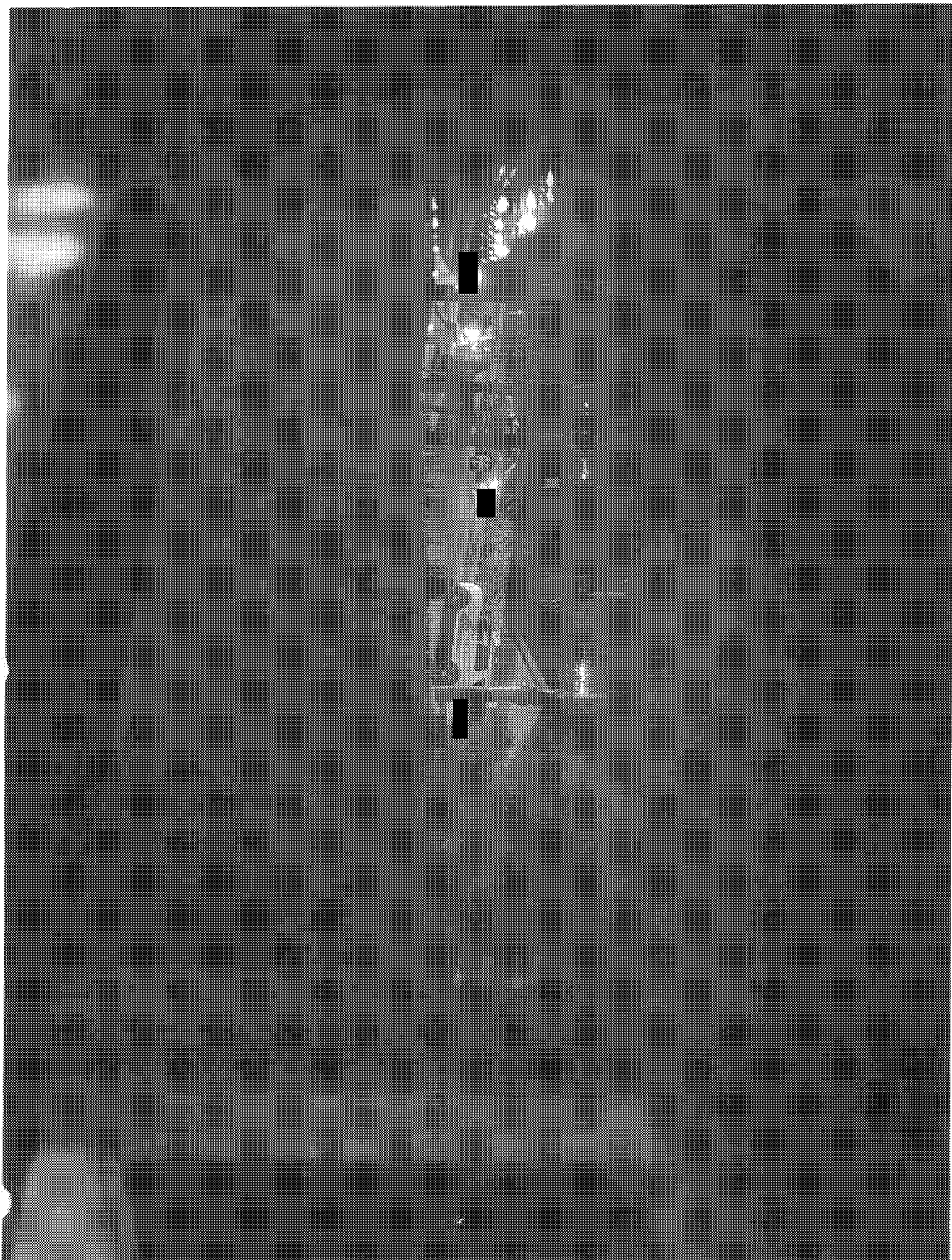

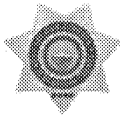

[REDACTED] made eye contact with the driver of the vehicle. The black male adult was later identified as Nicholas Campbell. [REDACTED] observed an unknown bright light emitting from inside of the vehicle. [REDACTED] told [REDACTED] it appeared Campbell had car trouble. [REDACTED] opened her garage door and parked her vehicle inside. As [REDACTED] entered her residence, [REDACTED] spoke to his neighbor on his telephone and [REDACTED] walked upstairs to look at the vehicle from the second story bedroom window.

While [REDACTED] was upstairs, she heard [REDACTED] call 9-1-1. [REDACTED] told [REDACTED] he should not call because she believed it was not needed. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] stood in the upstairs bedroom and watched Campbell sit inside of his vehicle. [REDACTED] walked downstairs and got a drink from the kitchen as [REDACTED] stayed upstairs. [REDACTED] returned upstairs to the bedroom and looked out the window again.

[REDACTED] observed a marked Sheriff's patrol vehicle parked behind Campbell's vehicle. [REDACTED] saw a deputy, later identified as Marcus Mason, seated in the front driver seat of the Sheriff's patrol vehicle with the headlights on. [REDACTED] did not observe any other lights activated on the Sheriff's vehicle. Mason appeared to be using his Mobile Data Computer (MDC). Mason exited his patrol vehicle, approached the driver side of Campbell's vehicle, as Campbell remained seated in the driver's seat. Mason held what [REDACTED] believed to be a flashlight, which illuminated the interior of Campbell's vehicle. [REDACTED] walked away from the window and stopped watching.

As [REDACTED] had her back to the window, she heard several gunshots. [REDACTED] yelled at [REDACTED] to get down on the ground. [REDACTED] heard approximately five gunshots in rapid succession. [REDACTED] looked out the window, and saw Mason on the ground, on his back, in the middle of the street. After approximately five seconds, [REDACTED] heard approximately five additional gunshots in rapid succession. [REDACTED] did not see Campbell and was unsure where he went.

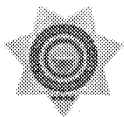

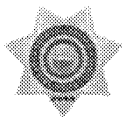

On Saturday, July 16, 2022, at approximately 2337 hours, [REDACTED] arrived home. [REDACTED] saw a Black male adult, later identified as Nicolas Campbell, sitting in the front driver's seat of a sedan, parked at the [REDACTED] curb line edge of [REDACTED] in front of his residence. [REDACTED] described Campbell as a balding, Black male adult. According to [REDACTED], it appeared Campbell was using a computer.

[REDACTED] text [REDACTED] and asked if he should call the police. [REDACTED] told [REDACTED] to call law enforcement and ask for a courtesy drive-by. [REDACTED] called 9-1-1 and asked for law enforcement to send a patrol officer to check on the vehicle.

[REDACTED] grew up in an area [REDACTED] of Pasadena. In [REDACTED] experience, if someone reported a Hispanic or Black subject to law enforcement, they sent a large police response. [REDACTED] joked with [REDACTED] and asked her to go upstairs and watch how many law enforcement vehicles arrived.

[REDACTED] and [REDACTED] went upstairs to the spare bedroom and looked out of the [REDACTED] facing window. [REDACTED] said, "I had a perfect view." [REDACTED] joked with [REDACTED] about how long it would take a patrol car to arrive. According to [REDACTED] in Pasadena if you reported a man with a gun it would take half an hour for law enforcement to arrive, but in Rancho Cucamonga, law enforcement would arrive in three minutes.

Approximately four minutes after [REDACTED] called 9-1-1, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] saw a marked San Bernardino County Sheriff's patrol vehicle arrive on the scene.

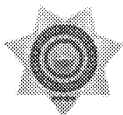

The patrol vehicle traveled [REDACTED] on [REDACTED] made a U-turn and parked behind the sedan, facing [REDACTED]. The patrol vehicle's headlamps were the only lights illuminating the sedan. According to [REDACTED] the patrol vehicle's emergency lights, take-down lights, and spotlights were not activated. After approximately 45 seconds, [REDACTED] saw the deputy exit his patrol vehicle and approach the sedan. The patrol deputy was later identified as Deputy Marcus Mason. [REDACTED] could not describe Mason. Moments before Mason arrived, Campbell stood on the [REDACTED] sidewalk and appeared to talk on a cellular telephone for approximately two minutes. During that time, Campbell appeared to motion to an unknown person [REDACTED] of Campbell's location on [REDACTED] did not see anyone else on [REDACTED] other than Campbell and Mason. When Mason approached the sedan, [REDACTED] did not know if Campbell was still on the sidewalk or in the sedan.

Mason approached the front driver's side of the sedan and spoke to Campbell for approximately two minutes. [REDACTED] was unable to hear the conversation. Mason returned to his patrol vehicle and sat in the front driver's seat. [REDACTED] did not remember if Mason closed his driver's side door or not. [REDACTED] told [REDACTED] that Mason used his computer to see if Campbell was wanted.

After approximately two to three minutes, Mason exited his patrol vehicle and approached the sedan in the same manner as before. Mason contacted Campbell at his driver's side front door, which was now halfway open. [REDACTED] did not see a flashlight in Mason's hand, but something illuminated the interior of the car. [REDACTED] did not know what illuminated the sedan. [REDACTED] thought the light came from a cellular telephone inside of the sedan. As soon as the light turned on, Campbell exited the sedan and immediately "grappled" with Mason. [REDACTED] did not see Mason or Campbell throw punches. Campbell and Mason grabbed onto each other and wrestled. [REDACTED] stated it looked like a "street fight." It appeared to [REDACTED] that Campbell caught Mason off guard.

After approximately 10 to 15 seconds, Campbell pushed Mason backward and Mason fell to the ground. As Mason lay on his back, Campbell stood over him. [REDACTED] heard approximately two to three consecutive gunshots, a pause for approximately 15 seconds, followed by an additional five to six gunshots. [REDACTED] saw the muzzle flash from a gun but could not tell if it was from Mason's or Campbell's gun. [REDACTED] was scared and lay on the bed in the spare room to conceal himself.

After a few seconds, [REDACTED] looked out the window again and only saw Mason, who lay in the middle of [REDACTED] no longer saw Campbell in the area. Mason rolled onto his right-side and faced [REDACTED] called 9-1-1 and told dispatch Mason was shot and to send additional deputies. According to [REDACTED] the dispatcher told him "We are busy, we are getting calls." [REDACTED] told the dispatcher that

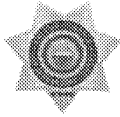

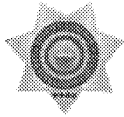
When [REDACTED] made the 9-1-1 call, he stood away from the window because he was afraid Campbell might see him. At that time [REDACTED] was unable to see outside. [REDACTED] saw responding deputies arrive approximately two minutes after he called 9-1-1.

[REDACTED] looked out the upstairs spare bedroom window and saw as deputies remove Mason's uniform and look for injuries.

Deputies lifted Mason and placed him into a patrol vehicle. [REDACTED] was unable to describe how deputies carried Mason. The patrol vehicle left the scene with Mason. [REDACTED] did not remember if the patrol vehicle used its emergency lights and sirens when transporting Mason. [REDACTED] did not remember if the Rancho Cucamonga Fire Department arrived before or after deputies transported Mason.

[REDACTED] stated he would not be able to recognize Campbell if he saw him again. [REDACTED] stated his vision was good and he only wore reading glasses when needed. [REDACTED] did not consume any alcoholic beverages before he witnessed the lethal force encounter (LFE). [REDACTED] agreed to allow investigators to photograph the bedroom.

WITNESS INTERVIEW:

I recorded the interview with my department issued digital recorder, and I later placed a copy of the recording into the case file. The following is a summary of my interview with [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] was the owner of [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga. During the initial crime scene processing, investigators saw possible bullet strikes on the stucco wall, located in the rear of [REDACTED] property. [REDACTED] allowed Crime Scene Investigator (CSI) [REDACTED] and I to examine his backyard for additional evidence.

On Sunday, July 17, 2022, at approximately 0000 hours, [REDACTED] was inside his bedroom and watched television. [REDACTED] was seated on the couch in their living room. The bedroom [REDACTED] was in and the living room where his [REDACTED] was seated were located on the [REDACTED] side of his property. As [REDACTED] was inside his bedroom, he heard seven gunshots. [REDACTED] described the cadence of gunfire as a rapid succession of four gunshots followed by a rapid succession of three gunshots. Initially, [REDACTED] thought an unknown person threw M-80 fireworks on [REDACTED] but quickly realized the sound he heard was gunshots.

Within a few seconds of the gunshots, [REDACTED] grabbed a large flashlight and walked into his backyard. [REDACTED] shined the flashlight [REDACTED] toward [REDACTED]. Initially, [REDACTED] did not see anyone on [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] panned the light [REDACTED] toward the intersection of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] observed an unknown race male, who wore a white shirt, riding a bicycle [REDACTED] on [REDACTED] near the [REDACTED] curb line.

Due to [REDACTED] vantage point, he was unable to see any marked patrol vehicles but heard several sirens in the distance. After a few minutes, [REDACTED] observed several marked San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department patrol units and additional patrol units from other law enforcement agencies arrive on scene. As [REDACTED] stood outside, he observed a helicopter land near the scene and take off shortly after landing. [REDACTED] reiterated he did not see any of the events that led up to the lethal force encounter (LFE).

WITNESS INTERVIEW: Deputy Kyle Smit

On Sunday, July 17, 2022, at approximately 0355 hours, I conducted an interview with Deputy Kyle Smit on the corner of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga. I recorded the interview on my department-issued digital recorder, and I later placed a copy of the audio file into the case file.

Prior to the interview, I informed Smit we were conducting a criminal investigation and we were looking for a voluntary interview. Smit agreed to speak with me and provide a voluntary interview.

Smit worked for the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department and was assigned to the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Training Division. From 2000 hours on Saturday, July 16, 2022, to 0800 hours on Sunday, July 17, 2022, Smit worked overtime at West Valley Detention Center due to critical staffing needs. Smit was the Medical Transport Rover (MDTR).

Smit wore his San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department "Class A," department-approved uniform, which consisted of a tan shirt with San Bernardino County Sheriff's patches on each shoulder, a metal San Bernardino County Sheriff's badge above the left breast pocket, and an American flag above the right breast pocket. In addition, Smit wore a utility belt, green uniform pants, and black boots. Smit was assigned call sign, "34 Paul 11," and drove a marked San Bernardino County Sheriff's patrol vehicle. The vehicle was equipped with overhead emergency lights and sirens, to include a solid, forward-facing, red light. The emergency vehicle had San Bernardino County Sheriff's logos along both sides.

On Sunday, July 17, 2022, at approximately 0001 hours, Smit conducted an occupied vehicle check at the ARCO AMPM gas station, located at 5020 E Fourth Street, in Ontario. At approximately 0002 hours, Smit heard emergency radio traffic reference a deputy that needed help. Smit remembered hearing "shots fired" and muffled radio traffic about the suspect possibly fled the scene. Smit immediately got into his patrol vehicle and looked at his Mobile Data Computer (MDC) to see where the deputy needed help. Smit saw the call on the MDC and learned it was near the intersection of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga.

Smit activated his patrol vehicle's overhead emergency lights and sirens and drove toward [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga. While Smit Drove, Sergeant Delatorre from the Rancho Sheriff's Station, assigned responding units intersections to park at so they could establish a perimeter. At approximately 0012 hours, Smit arrived in the area of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga. At approximately 0012 hours, Smit heard radio traffic which indicated the suspect possibly fled [REDACTED] from [REDACTED]

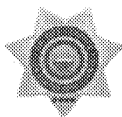

WITNESS INTERVIEW CONTINUED: Deputy Kyle Smit

Smit was not familiar with Rancho Cucamonga streets due to not being assigned to that city. Smit observed a San Bernardino County Sheriff's patrol vehicle without overhead mounted emergency lights that drove [REDACTED] from [REDACTED]

Smit followed the patrol vehicle into the parking lot of [REDACTED] which was located at [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga. The patrol vehicle stopped, and Smit observed Deputy Eric Rebollar get out of the driver's seat and walk toward the rear passenger door. Rebollar opened the back door and pulled out Deputy Marcus Mason from the back seat. Smit noticed there was an unknown deputy sheriff and unknown paramedic in the backseat with Mason. Mason wore a white T-shirt, black boxers, and black socks. Mason had an apparent gunshot wound to his abdomen area.

Mason appeared to Smit to be in duress, because Mason's eyes were squinted, his mouth was opened, and his teeth were clinched. Smit asked Rebollar if they needed any assistance and Rebollar said they did not. Rebollar further explained they were going to carry Mason to a nearby helicopter that just landed, so he could be flown to a local hospital. Rebollar carried Mason from underneath his arms and another unknown deputy carried him by his feet.

Smit left Rebollar and attempted to locate the suspect, who was still outstanding. Smit drove [REDACTED] through the parking lot of [REDACTED] Smit overheard radio traffic from dispatch that a reporting party called and stated they saw a Black male adult, running [REDACTED] toward [REDACTED] Smit located a dirt parking lot on the [REDACTED] of [REDACTED] which was [REDACTED] of [REDACTED] Smit heard an additional radio broadcast indicating that the suspect was last seen hiding in bushes near [REDACTED]

Smit found a portion of the campus that had a lot of foliage, which was [REDACTED] of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] of [REDACTED] At approximately 0019 hours, Smit observed a Black male adult, later identified as Nicholas Campbell, walk out from one of the bushes on the [REDACTED] corner of the parking lot. Campbell wore a tan T-shirt and unknown color basketball shorts. Smit believed Campbell was the outstanding suspect, because he hid in the bushes and fit the suspect's description.

Smit was approximately 150 yards from Campbell, but could clearly see him. Smit broadcasted "priority traffic" on the police radio and notified units he saw the suspect in the parking lot of [REDACTED] As Smit approached Campbell in his emergency vehicle, Campbell ran [REDACTED] through the bushes and down a hill toward [REDACTED] Smit broadcasted he was in foot pursuit of Campbell as he ran after him. Smit fell down the steep hill, which separated [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] Smit briefly lost visual of Campbell, but noticed he ran [REDACTED] toward [REDACTED] Smit last saw Campbell on the [REDACTED] side of [REDACTED] which was a [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] roadway from [REDACTED]

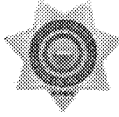

WITNESS INTERVIEW CONTINUED: Deputy Kyle Smit

Smit noticed San Bernardino County Sheriff's Aviation Unit (40 King 6) overhead and he notified them of Campbell's last known location. Additionally, Smit observed a San Bernardino County Sheriff's patrol vehicle coming toward him with its overhead emergency lights and sirens activated. Smit ran [REDACTED] and heard 40K6 broadcast that Campbell was running [REDACTED] on [REDACTED]. As Smit ran on [REDACTED] he saw Campbell look back and stop running. Campbell turned toward Smit, placed his hands in the air, and laid on the ground.

Smit placed his body weight on Campbell's lower back and placed his arms behind his back. Deputy Melanie Aguayo arrived and assisted handcuffing Campbell. Smit insured there was adequate spacing and double locked the handcuffs. Campbell was breathing hard, sweating profusely, and refused to speak. Smit searched Campbell and located a grey key fob in his front right jean's pocket and an electronic benefits transfer (EBT) card in his front left jean's pocket.

Aguayo and Smit assisted Campbell to his feet and escorted him to Aguayo's patrol vehicle. Smit placed Campbell near rear passenger side C-pillar of Aguayo's patrol vehicle and searched him. Aguayo used a gunshot residue (GSR) kit and swabbed Campbell's left and right hand. Campbell was placed into the rear-locked portion of Aguayo's patrol vehicle by Smit. Aguayo utilized investigative databases and confirmed Campbell's identity through his California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) photograph.

Smit wore a department-issued digital recorder and explained it was activated from the time he conducted a vehicle check up until Campbell was placed into the rear, locked-portion, of Aguayo's patrol vehicle. Smit handed me his recorder and I downloaded the recording into the case file.

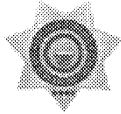

WITNESS INTERVIEW: Melanie Aguayo

On Sunday, July 17, 2022, at approximately 0616 hours, Deputy Dylan Gossweiler and I interviewed Deputy Melanie Aguayo at the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department, Rancho Cucamonga Station, located at 10510 Civic Center Drive, in Rancho Cucamonga. I recorded the interview with my department-issued digital recorder, and I later placed a copy of the recording into the case file. The following is a summary of our interview with Aguayo.

On Saturday, July 16, 2022, at approximately 2350 hours, Aguayo was transporting a cite-release arrestee to the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department, West Valley Detention Center. Aguayo was assigned call sign 11P11. Aguayo heard Deputy Marcus Mason broadcast over the radio, "shots fired, I've been hit and cannot feel my legs." Aguayo heard an additional broadcast from Mason who stated the outstanding suspect was on parole and possibly had a gunshot wound.

Aguayo stopped her patrol vehicle at the corner of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] and released her arrestee with a citation. Aguayo activated her emergency lights and siren and responded to the area of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. Aguayo parked her patrol vehicle at the intersection of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] to hold a perimeter.

Aguayo heard a radio broadcast from an unknown deputy who stated the suspect was seen running [REDACTED] through [REDACTED]. Aguayo drove in the area of [REDACTED] and saw an unknown deputy run across [REDACTED] with a flashlight. Aguayo drove west on [REDACTED] and saw the suspect, later identified as Nicolas Campbell, walk from the driveway of [REDACTED]. Aguayo was approximately 15 feet away from Campbell. When Campbell saw Aguayo's patrol vehicle, he lay face down with his arms extended outward.

Aguayo placed Campbell at gunpoint and gave Campbell a verbal order not to move. Deputy Kyle Smit hand-cuffed Campbell with his hands to his rear and doubled locked the handcuffs. Aguayo and Smit rolled Campbell over to his left side then right side to look for weapons and to check if Campbell had any gunshot wounds. Aguayo did not see any wounds on Campbell and did not locate a firearm. Campbell did not speak to Aguayo or Smit. Aguayo smelled suspected marijuana emitting from Campbell. Aguayo located an Electronic Benefit Card (EBT) with Campbell's name imprinted on the ground, next to Campbell. Smit located a Toyota key fob on Campbell's person. Aguayo did not know which pocket Smit removed the key fob. Aguayo placed Campbell to the rear of her patrol vehicle.

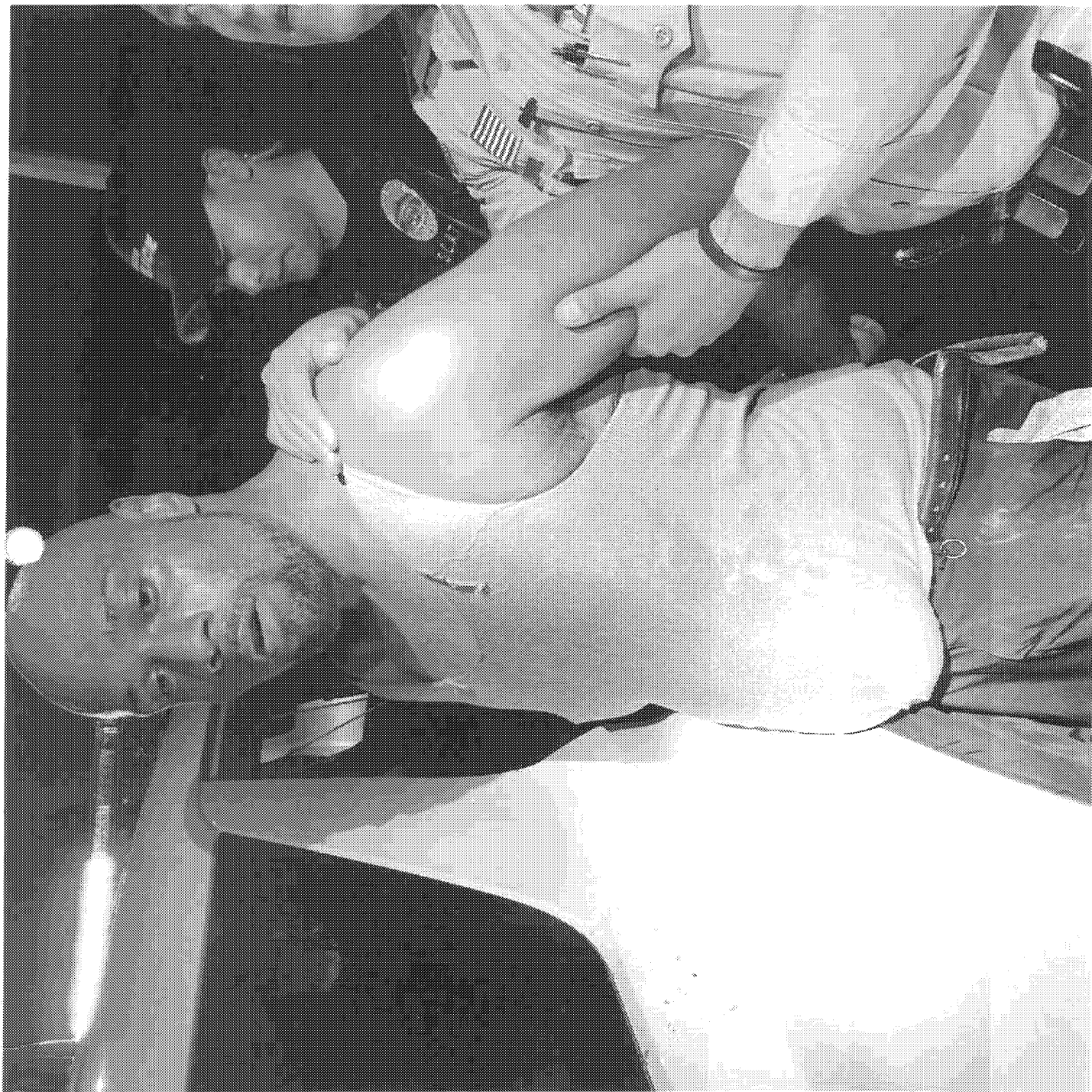

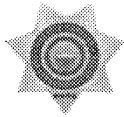

On Wednesday, July 20, 2022, at approximately 1400 hours, I interviewed Rancho Cucamonga Fire Department (RCFD) Paramedic [REDACTED] by telephone. I recorded the interview with my department issued recorder, and I later placed a copy of the recording into the case file. The following is a summary of my interview with [REDACTED]

Prior to the interview, I explained to [REDACTED] that I desired to conduct a voluntary interview with him, and no discipline could be brought if he declined to provide a voluntary statement. [REDACTED] agreed to provide a voluntary statement regarding the lethal force encounter (LFE).

Since [REDACTED] Wherry was employed by RCFD as a firefighter/paramedic. On Saturday, July 16, 2022, to Sunday, July 17, 2022, [REDACTED] was assigned to Medic Engine (ME) 175 from 0800 hours to 0800 hours as a firefighter/paramedic. [REDACTED] was assigned to ME 175 with [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]

On Sunday, July 17, 2022, at approximately 0002 hours, [REDACTED] slept at RCFD Station 173, when he was dispatched to a gunshot wound patient near the intersection of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] boarded ME 175 and drove to [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] with the ME's lights and sirens activated. [REDACTED] sat in the rear seat of the [REDACTED] he looked at the call for service on his computer and observed a San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department (SBCSD) deputy was shot.

At approximately 0010 hours, ME 175 arrived on scene. [REDACTED] exited ME 175 and observed a deputy, later identified as Marcus Mason, on the ground being treated by two unknown deputies. The deputies who provided medical aid to Mason had stripped Mason of his uniform and Mason wore a white shirt and boxers. The deputies picked up Mason from the ground and carried him to a marked SBCSD patrol vehicle. The deputies informed [REDACTED] Mason was shot, and they were transporting him to an awaiting Ontario Police Department (OPD) helicopter.

The deputies placed Mason in the backseat of the patrol unit and [REDACTED] sat in the backseat with Mason. An unknown deputy drove Mason and [REDACTED] to the OPD helicopter. As they drove toward the helicopter, [REDACTED] observed a white bandage on Mason's abdomen. Due to the limited room in the backseat of the unit, [REDACTED] was unable to see any additional injuries on Mason. Mason informed [REDACTED] he was shot in the abdomen and was unsure of any additional gunshot wounds (GSW).

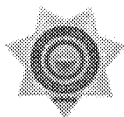

FIRE INTERVIEW: *Rancho Cucamonga Fire Department*

Within a couple minutes, the unit arrived at the landing zone for the OPD helicopter. [REDACTED] was unsure of the exact location of the landing zone but believed it was at or near [REDACTED]. Additional deputies assisted Mason out of the patrol unit and into the OPD helicopter. As Mason was placed in the OPD helicopter, [REDACTED] grabbed his medical bag from the marked SBCSD patrol unit and boarded the helicopter.

Once inside the helicopter, [REDACTED] informed the OPD pilots to transport Mason to the closest trauma center, which was [REDACTED]. As they flew to [REDACTED] assessed Mason for additional injuries. The only injuries [REDACTED] observed on Mason were two gunshot wounds to his abdomen, which was where the original bandage was placed. Since the gunshot wounds were above Mason's navel, [REDACTED] removed the bandage and placed a chest seal on the gunshot wounds.

During the flight, [REDACTED] continued to speak to Mason and asked where he was in pain. Mason told [REDACTED] the only area where he was in pain was his abdomen. [REDACTED] placed his hand on Mason's chest and asked him to take deep breaths. As Mason breathed, [REDACTED] kept his hand on Mason's chest to ensure he had equal rise and fall from his chest. Based on [REDACTED] initial assessment, he believed Mason's breathing was normal, and Mason continued to speak to [REDACTED]. Mason also informed [REDACTED] he could not feel his legs. [REDACTED] conducted an initial assessment for any additional gunshot wounds to Mason but did not locate any.

Within a few minutes, the helicopter arrived at [REDACTED]. Once the helicopter landed, [REDACTED] hospital staff approached the helicopter and placed Mason onto a wheelchair. [REDACTED] medical staff took Mason inside the hospital and [REDACTED] told an unknown [REDACTED] medical staff member Mason's injuries and treatment he performed.

Once inside the [REDACTED] stood back and while [REDACTED] took over treatment of Mason. [REDACTED] had no additional information, and I concluded my interview with him.

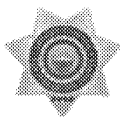

On Monday, August 22, 2022, at approximately 1626 hours, I interviewed Michael Ayala at 2009 Porterfield Way, in Upland. I recorded the interview with my department-issued digital recorder, and I later placed a copy of the recording into the case file. The following is a summary of my interview with Ayala.

Ayala was a Tactical Flight Officer (TFO) for the Ontario Police Department for approximately four years. According to Ayala the TFO duties include operation of the helicopter's cameras and radio broadcasting.

On Saturday, July 16, 2022, at approximately 2357 hours, Ayala was in his office at 2009 Porterfield Way, in Upland. Ayala was assigned call sign PD-20. Ayala heard a radio broadcast of an officer down in the city of Rancho Cucamonga. Ayala heard a deputy, later identified as Marcus Mason, broadcast he was shot and provided a suspect description.

Ayala was approached by pilot Derrick Alatorre and asked to respond with him to the incident location at [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga. Alatorre communicated with Fontana Police Department's Aviation, Eagle-1 and San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department Aviation, 40-King to determine who was closer to the incident location. Alatorre and Ayala arrived on-scene at approximately 0010 hours.

While enroute to the incident location, Ayala heard an unknown deputy radio broadcast and request a helicopter to transport Manson to the nearest hospital. Ayala and Alatorre decided to conduct a "Blue-evac." A Blue-evac is when a law enforcement helicopter lands at an offsite location to transport a wounded law enforcement officer to a hospital. Alatorre communicated over the radio with 40-K, pilot Ted Byerly, for permission to transport Mason. Since Alatorre was on-scene and Byerly had not arrived, Byerly instructed Alatorre to land and transport Mason.

Ayala and Alatorre decided to land the helicopter in the [REDACTED] parking lot of [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga. Ayala broadcasted over the radio to Rancho Cucamonga deputies and instructed them where to bring Mason. When Alatorre landed, Ayala removed a rear seat in the helicopter to allow space for Mason. Ayala opened the helicopter side door to await Mason's arrival.

Within a couple of seconds, Ayala saw San Bernardino County Sheriff's patrol vehicles drive from the [REDACTED] toward the helicopter. Ayala saw the patrol vehicle's emergency lights were activated. Ayala saw approximately four to five deputies remove Mason from the rear of the patrol vehicle and carry Mason toward the helicopter. Two unknown deputies carried Mason under each arm, while two unknown deputies carried Mason's legs. Mason's wore boxer shorts and Ayala saw Mason's shirt was covered in blood. The deputies placed Mason into the helicopter. Additionally, Ayala saw an unknown Rancho Cucamonga Fire Department Paramedic enter the helicopter to provide medical aid to Mason. Ayala provided the paramedic with a headset so they could communicate while in flight. Ayala asked the paramedic which hospital he wanted to transport Mason. The paramedic responded, "the closest one."

Alatorre flew [REDACTED] to the closest hospital, [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] in Pomona. Ayala broadcasted to Ontario dispatch they were enroute to [REDACTED] Ontario dispatch informed [REDACTED] Mason was enroute to their location with a gunshot wound. Ayala concentrated on the flight and could

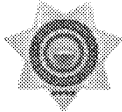

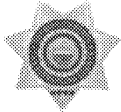

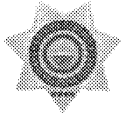

[REDACTED] was a Parole Officer for the State of California, assigned to the Fresno area. Nicholas Campbell was parolee, assigned to [REDACTED] on Monday, September 20, 2021. Campbell's controlling charge was [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] met with Campbell twice a week. [REDACTED] said Campbell had a [REDACTED] but was unable to provide me with medical information or a [REDACTED] for Campbell. When [REDACTED] first met with Campbell, he stated he did not trust law enforcement. Campbell was cooperative and never violent toward [REDACTED]

Campbell provided [REDACTED] with his home address of [REDACTED] in Fresno and said he resided with [REDACTED]. Through investigation [REDACTED] learned Campbell lied about residing at the [REDACTED] residence and was actually [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] transferred Campbell to Parole Officer [REDACTED] in Merced, California. Campbell was transferred for better living conditions to reside with his [REDACTED]. In June of 2022, Campbell was transferred back to [REDACTED] after testing positive for methamphetamine. Campbell was once again [REDACTED] while residing in Fresno.

According to Campbell, he worked for [REDACTED] in Fresno. [REDACTED] was unable to verify Campbell's employment. [REDACTED] was unaware of any other source of income for Campbell.

Campbell later requested a transfer to the City of Los Angeles to reside with his [REDACTED]. Campbell's transfer was denied, and he was supposed to remain in Fresno.

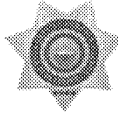

District Attorney Investigator Cody Manning

On Wednesday, March 27, 2024, at about 1354 hours, I conducted an interview with District Attorney Investigator Cody Manning. At the time of the lethal force encounter (LFE), Manning was employed by the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department. At the time of this interview, Manning was employed by the San Bernardino County District Attorney's Office. The interview was conducted over the telephone. The following is a summary of the interview.

On Saturday, July 16, 2022, at 1600 hours to Sunday, July 17, 2022, from 0200 hours, Manning was a Tactical Flight Officer (TFO) assigned to the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department (SBCSD), Aviation Division. Manning was assigned to SBCSD Aviation Unit "40K6," with Sheriff's Pilot Ted Byerly.

Manning's duties as a TFO included radio communication with law enforcement agencies, utilizing the camera equipment in the helicopter, and any other duty the pilot is unable to do while the pilot performed his duties. While the pilot flew the helicopter, his responsibility was to coordinate with other aircraft in the area, monitor the terrain, and ensure the helicopter was piloted in a safe manner. Generally, the pilot did not know what occurred on the ground because he flew the aircraft, which was the primary duty.

On Sunday, July 17, 2024, at about 0009 hours, Manning and Byerly were notified by Sheriff's Dispatch, Deputy Marcus Mason was shot in the City of Rancho Cucamonga. Manning and Byerly left the aviation hangar in San Bernardino and flew to Rancho Cucamonga to assist.

Byerly coordinated with Ontario Police Department's (OPD) Aviation and Fontana Police Department's (FPD) Aviation, who were both already at the scene of the shooting. OPD Aviation advised [REDACTED] they picked up Deputy Marcus Mason to transport him to a hospital. Since FPD's Aviation was on scene and assisted law enforcement who were present on the ground, Manning and Byerly flew at about 3500 feet of elevation, which was about 3,000 feet above the normal elevation.

Manning utilized the thermal imaging camera in the helicopter to assist law enforcement. At about 0019 hours, Manning heard Deputy Kyle Smith broadcast over the Sheriff's radio he located the suspect, later identified as Nicholas Campbell, in the dirt field area of [REDACTED] located at [REDACTED] in Rancho Cucamonga.

Since Smit located the suspect quickly, Manning did not have time to activate the helicopter's recording device. According to Manning, the camera could have potentially caused technological issues which would have disabled other features in the helicopter. Manning did not want to lose sight of the Campbell or Smit.

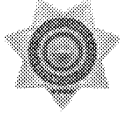

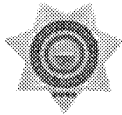

Campbell ran [REDACTED] on [REDACTED] on the [REDACTED] side of the street. After 40K6 passed about five or six residences on [REDACTED] Manning briefly lost sight of Campbell while the helicopter was in a left-hand orbit. A short time later, Manning saw Campbell in the driveway of a residence where Smit contacted him and placed him into custody.

After Campbell was taken into custody, Manning and Byerly continued their orbital search of the area until Campbell was confirmed as the suspect involved in LFE with Mason. After Campbell was confirmed as the suspect in the LFE, Manning and Byerly flew back to their aviation hangar in San Bernardino, landed the helicopter, and ended their shift.

Manning had no additional information, and I ended the interview with Manning.

On Wednesday, July 20, 2022, at approximately 1102 hours, Deputy Jared Sims and I went to [REDACTED] located at [REDACTED] in the city of Ontario, to speak with staff regarding a vehicle purchased by Nicholas Campbell. Sims and I entered the office and spoke with [REDACTED] recorded the interview on my department-issued digital recorder, and I later placed a copy of the audio file into the case file. The following is a summary of our interview with [REDACTED]

I asked [REDACTED] if he was willing to provide information regarding a vehicle purchased from [REDACTED] [REDACTED] agreed to provide information. I advised [REDACTED] that I was looking for information on the sale record of a gray 2009 Toyota Venza, bearing California plate # [REDACTED] [REDACTED] located the vehicle sales record and showed me a copy of the sales contract. [REDACTED] sold the vehicle to Campbell on Saturday, July 9, 2022. Campbell paid a \$7,498 partial payment and financed the remaining \$4,456.75. Campbell agreed to make weekly payments of \$1,000 until the vehicle was paid off.

According to [REDACTED] on Saturday, July 9, 2022, Campbell purchased a different vehicle and left the car lot. Approximately one hour later, Campbell returned and exchanged the vehicle for the Toyota Venza. [REDACTED] did not usually allow for exchanges after a vehicle was purchased, but [REDACTED] agreed to exchange the vehicle. When Campbell purchased the first vehicle he had an unidentified Hispanic female with him. [REDACTED] described the female as a Hispanic female adult with short black hair and several tattoos. The second vehicle Campbell purchased was identified as the gray 2009 Toyota Venza, bearing California plate # [REDACTED] which was at the scene of the attempted murder on Sunday, July 17, 2022, in Rancho Cucamonga.

Sims asked [REDACTED] if he knew why Campbell was in the area, since the address on his credit application was from Fresno. [REDACTED] did not know so he brought [REDACTED] into the office. [REDACTED] was the salesman who sold Campbell the vehicle. According to [REDACTED] Campbell traveled back and forth from Fresno and Southern California and worked as a solar panel salesman.

[REDACTED] provided me with a copy of Campbell's California driver's license, a copy of Campbell's credit application, and a copy of the sales contract for the vehicle. I scanned the items and attached them to this report and placed them into the case file.

[REDACTED] did not have any additional information to provide, and we concluded our interview with him.

00:02:59 timestamp: Mason exited his patrol vehicle and shut the door.

00:03:12 timestamp: Mason returned to Campbell's vehicle and asked if he was on parole, Campbell replied, "Yes, sir."

00:03:14 timestamp: Mason asked Campbell if he had anything illegal in the vehicle and Campbell replied, "No."

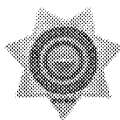

During the call, Mason contacted Nicholas Campbell as he was seated in his vehicle. During a pat down search, Campbell removed a Sig Sauer P320 .40 Caliber semi automatic pistol from his waistband and shot Mason multiple times. One of the bullets struck Mason's ballistic vest and was lodged in it. Mason was able to disarm Campbell and the firearm was left at the scene when Campbell fled. A short period of time later, Campbell was taken into custody without further incident.
